## Trip Chairman's Report:

## Getting Hammered, by Mark Werkmeister

Well, we finally did it. After being invited two years ago and trying without success to schedule the trip for the intervening two years, we finally were able to subject ourselves and our vehicles to THE HAMMERS. Yes. I am talking about the trails in the Johnson Valley OHV area in California that are discussed in hushed and reverent tones: Sledgehammer, Jackhammer, and the brand new Hell's Gate/Sunbonnet Pass trails.

Pat Brady, LP How, and myself left Albuquerque the Saturday morning before Thanksgiving for the long highway haul to the high desert above Palm Springs. We made a easy two days of it, going as far as Kingman. $A Z$ on Saturday night and arriving in Yucca Valley, CA around noon on Sunday. We set up camp at the Black Rock Campground in nearby Joshua Tree National Park and unloaded the vehicles. That evening, our guide stopped by to make final arrangements. Our guide is a four wheeler of some note, none other than 4 Wheel Drive \& Sport Utility magazine editor, Phil Howell. We also met our other trail companions for the next three days. Shawn and Danni Gregory, owners of Tuffy Security Products, and Greg, the owner of a Land Rover accessories company, would be joining us on the trails. Shawn and Danni were driving a well-equipped Wrangler and Greg was driving a Defender 90 on $35^{\prime \prime}$ tires!

After packing away a hearty breakfast the next morning, we left for the trails. The trails are about twenty miles north and 2000 feet down from Yucca Valley. After airing down and pysching ourselves up, we headed up Sledgehammer Canyon. Much press has been

given to Sledgehammer, the first of the trails created by the Victor Valley 4-Wheelers in the Johnson Valley OHV area. Believe me, the pictures don't do it justice! Picture a rocky canyon, rockier than The Wolis Run or the Guardian, on a grade that approaches 40 degrees in some sections. It just climbs, and climbs, and climbs! Bottom line: Great fun! We reached the halfway point on the trail without incident (except for a cut sidewall which we plugged) and headed into the second half of the trail. This section wasn't as steep but it contained some really tight turns and steep climbs. We finally ended up high on the ridge line with the rocky sections behind us! No damage! Not for long......

On the way back, we took a route called the Fissure Mountain Trail (the Landers earthquake a few years ago was centered nearby) that was mostly easy climbs and ridge running. However, on the descent we hit a steep rocky off camber section. Too Long dropped off of a ledge and added a beauty mark courtesy of some nearby rocks. LP was jealous so he dropped off the same ledge and added a similar mark to his fresh, pristine paint! Oh well, we knew we were facing some of the most challenging rocks in the nation on this trip. The Defender had fared well but the driver had not. A previously injured back didn't like the rocks and he called it quits and headed home.

The next day, we were joined by Glenn Wakefield in his Samurai and we ran the brand new trail called Sunbonnet Pass. This is actually two linked trails that were first run by the public during the Fun in the Desert event in October. The first canyon was called Hell's Gate and it wasn't as steep as Sledgehammer the day before. It was, however, really tight and technical and wheel placement was the key to success. After topping out on a tidge, we faced the Devil's Slide. This is the STEEPEST. ROCKIEST, descent that we have even seen. If you don't like falling off a cliff, the pucker factor was really high. After reaching the bottom, we headed up the next canyon to Sunbonnet Pass. The Samurai had broken a rear spring and although Pat welded it back together, it didn't last long on the rocks before separating again and giving Glenn no end of trouble. One squeeze rock/climb in particular was difficult in dimensionally challenged
vehicles like a Scrambler or a Bronco. The yellow beast made it through unscathed but the Bronco received a rocker panel beating as it bounced its way through.

The third day was the big finale. We had requested to run them in order of difficulty and Phil had saved Jackhammer for last. This trail has changed from the original. There was a new descent down a difficult canyon instead of the old intersection with the Sledgehammer trail. Jackhammer is a wild one! Steep like Sledgehammer, tight and constricted like Sunbonnet, it tested us to the highest level yet. We reached the top relatively unscathed except for catching a front fender on the Scrambler. After lunch, we dropped (and the operative word here is "dropped") into the new descent. The trail is basically a canyon that has just enough rocks levered down into it to make it feasible (note that I did not say intelligent) to drive your vehicle down across the rubble field. This one was a beast!!! The Bronco started accumulating battle scars and near the bottom, took a hard hit to the door and door frame. LP, not to be outdone, smacked one of his half doors hard on the same rock that ravaged the Bronco. By the time we reached the bottom, we were happy to see the end of the rocks for the day.

We took it easy on Thanksgiving Day, sleeping in, sending the Tuffy crowd on their way. We spent time soaking in a hot spring before taking in a traditional Thanksgiving dinner at a local restaurant. The wind that had been plaguing the campsite the whole week was at it again Thursday evening, rocking the RV and rattling anything left outside.

Friday, we decided to take it a little easier and joined Phil and a friend on a trail through the Dalc mining district. Very scenic and interesting old ruins for the mining history buffs among us. The wind howled all day (I rode with LP since he had a top along) and we were glad we were not in the canyons. LP left for Santa Fe when we got back Friday evening and Pat and I left early Saturday morning for home. We ended up driving the route home straight through since the weather was good and the traffic was still relatively light.

We went, we wheeled, we got hammered! I think this trip was the most fun that I have ever had on the trails and we will certainly return in a couple

## Jemez Trail Clearing, by Joel Wilson

On Saturday, November 16, seven $4 \times 4 \mathrm{~s}$ met at 8:30 AM at the intersection of NM 528 and NM 44 for a day of trail clearing in the snow. Attending were Charlie and Jocl Wilson, Pat and Sue Brady, Berry and Kyle Harrison, Mark Wolf, Mark Werkmeister, Bert Allen, Pete Capper, Vince Ramer, and Tom Hurt.

We left around 9:00 AM for the treasure hunt area and found that it had in fact snowed a couple inches. We took the tunnel road with all the dirt berms up to the Peggy Mesa road, which we in turn followed to the trail to be cleared. No one had any troubles until the top of the tunnel road where there are some boulders one can optionally navigate. The first few vehicles made it fine, but by the time Vince, Berry, and Tom got there, it was "slicker than snot." People don't seem to learn from other's mistakes. Vince's Wrangler slid off the line and needed a push backward to get off. The big Scout proceeded to do the same thing, and being so heavy, was towed off. Then Tom came along in his five and got into the worst predicament of all when he slid off the rocks and became stuck on his front U-joint. But with proper rock placement and some all-out grunt from the men he was lifted and pushed off,

An hour later after driving through snow and fog so thick you couldn't see the vehicle in front of you, we arrived at the trail and commenced to clear it. It must have been near freezing and at lunch a few people lit up their stoves for a hot lunch. Nonetheless, a lot of work got done and the first mile or so of the trail is now clear. Because of the snow, getting back proved to be quite interesting. Wolfie decided he could back his Commando over a big berm for an easy turnaround. The only problem was that he took the

berm at an angle going forward but because of the snow slid perpendicular to it going back. But Berry towed him off in a second. Soon after the Land Rover Discovery became high centered on a berm and was pushed back off, but with more momentum the second time it was no problem. What was a problem for the Disco was a log farther up the trail. The $\log$ was perpendicular to the trail and when he slid off it the lower plastic part of the rocker panel was slightly damaged. So the $\log$ was moved and there were no more problems, even on a relatively steep section, until the group split up.

Berry, Bert, and Pete went home while the rest of us took off for more adventure. Mark wolf took the lead and led us into progressively deeper snow. Then the road deteriorated and we had to cross an eroded ditch in multiple places. Everyone made the first crossing but the second was a problem. Here the ditch was 8 ft wide and 4 ft deep. Wolfie got the front of his Commando through but not the rear, then slid 10 ft sideways into a worse position yet where he couldn't back up. Fifteen feet away was a huge tree to winch on, but Mark still had not installed the winch he bought months ago. (Editor's note: Doesn't that deserve a fine!) Then Pat tried to cross the ditch to winch Mark forward, but he also got stuck when his front tires hit a snow-covered log. This was turning out to be a great day to get stuck! At this point I counted seven! Pat used his winch to get himself and Mark out, everyone else turned around (though not without trouble), and we all headed back. The day ended at 5:30 back at the pavement, and I think that everyone had a good time.

## BLITZ '97: A Nationwide MultipleUse Campaign

The time has come for the multiple-use community $(4 \times 4$, ATV, mountain bikers, snowmobilers, motorcyclists, equestrians and anyone who enjoys our public lands and natural resources) to make a difference! January 1997 marks the beginning of "Blitz'97", a nationwide campaign designed to help us become a strong, unified and focused effort in the next few years. It will be one of the most significant impacts on public officials since the birth of the environmental movement (if you help).

I am the facilitator for this effort and would like to let you know what it means and how you can help. We have nearly 100 local, state, regional and national organizations already participating in the design and implementation of Blitz '97. We are an informal affiliation of people who are mostly tired of seeing our lands and activities managed through the voices of a vocal few. Blitz ' 97 is going to change all that.

We chose the slogan "Blitz '97" for specific reasons. Yes, it's possible for people who oppose our ideas to take shots at our slogan; but that doesn't concern us. In the dictionary, the word blitz means "a concentrated effort; an intensive campaign." In football, it means a sudden charge by a defensive backfield player through a gap in the opposing line. And yes, there are connotations to warfare for you history buffs. In war, it is associated with a sudden, large-scale and overwhelming offensive. On the offensive (or better said, on the proactive) is exactly where we plan to be. Starting now.

We have taken this effort to the Internet group known as the Land Use Network, sponsored by Off-Road.com. I am the moderator for the Network and welcome you to join us for interactive discussions about land use issues and

Before you ask, I thought I'd spend just a second and give you my credentials for spearheading and facilitating this effort. First, I have a B.S. in Forestry, with a M.A. in Environmental Planning. I have been a back country driver (via $4 \times 4$, bikes and dune buggies) for over 30 years. I am a professional facilitator (meetings, conferences, etc) with 15 years experience for over 3000 people. I also believe in Blitz '97 and what it means.

With many new congressional members (as well as the normal turnover in state and local officials), 1997 is a prime time to establish a new image of folks who enjoy using and having access to public lands. We plan to spend this next year in a concentrated effort to reach out to our public officials/congressional representatives and let them know who we responsible users are; what we do; and why they need to support us.

Some state, regional and national organizations will be joining us in our efforts as well as conducting their own major campaigns. It is my hope that we can pull these together into a coordinated effort with similar and overlapping messages. That is what Blitz 97 is about. It will help provide that common message that we can all refer to. It will provide focus points from which we can build a variety of themes. And it will kick off a media/congressional letter-writing and educational campaign the likes of which has not been seen for some time.

In the next series of discussions on the Land Use Network, we will address the purpose, common themes and focus points, issues/concerns/opportunities, and implementation details of Blitz 97. Feel free to contribute to the further development of our efforts......we look forward to your help.

Here is the Purpose Statement of Blitz 97:

Muster support in congress.
Use letters, email, fax, and personal contacts. Look for opportunities to advocate your sport. Team up with other advocates/users in your area to magnify your position.
Improve our image.
Provide a contact point for elected officials and their staff.
Leap ahead of anti multiple-use efforts.
Expose elected officials to our sports and ideas.
Understand the issues, both local and national. Sort out our political friends and supporters. Educate the public, our peers, and the politicians.

## RIO GRANDE/BLOWHOLE RUN, by

 Joel WilsonOn Sunday, February 2, nineteen people and twelve vehicles met at the Santa Fe Outlet Center for a romp in the mud and snow on Caja del Rio Plateau. Attending were Charlie and Joel Wilson, Tom Hurt, Jason Martinez, Fernando Fernandez, Bobby Thomas, Barry and Deborah Harrison, Pat and Sue Brady, Ruben Martinez, Jeremy Martinez, Pat Mellady, Bob Pessetto, Paul Thompson, and Garry Brown.

We started out on a fun road that follows the power lines through the Buckman Wash area below the plateau, and cuts straight across
country. That meant steep hill climbs and descents. Luckily the uphill side was the sunny and dry side, and the downhill side was not too snow covered to be dangerous. A couple of hours later we drove through a neat little canyon that is about twenty feet wide with thirty foot vertical rock and dirt walls. We then drove down to the Rio Grande, where a narrow road that was a challenge for the larger vehicles brought us to our lunch spot under a large cottonwood tree. There we saw a mud covered Blazer with 40 inch tall tires, but little did we know that this would be a symbol for things to come. We also saw a bald eagle and a large cave high on the opposite cliffs above the river.

After lunch we drove onto Caja del Rio Plateau and found the roads to be very muddy. The mud there is shallow, sticky, and extremely slick, and it was often impossible to get out of the ruts. This turned out to be a problem when the ruts became deep. I noticed that the ruts in front of me were becoming very deep and eventually the Jeep was stopped. There is a new National Park Service Head.
Your 4-WD vehicles have many gears you use to drive with. But you need an additional one. You have to get your Ietter-writing into gear!!

The extreme environmentalist groups like the Sierra Club (SC) and the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance (SUWA) are very organized and effective in letter writing, e-mailing, and lobbying our congressmen to get what they want - vast areas of the country entirely shut down to motorized traffic. It is an SC goal to eliminate ALL motorized recreation on federal lands by the year 2000. SUWA wants 5.7 MILLION acres of Utah turned into complete wilderness.

We have to fight back, or we will soon be driving over speed bumps in supermarket parking lots for our recreation. We are definitely for protecting
the environment, but we must stand firm to preserve our access to it via existing roads.

Blitz 97 is a campaign by the Land Use Network (LUN) of the Off-Road list on the Internet to protect our interests by making our wishes known to our congressmen and other government agencies (BLM, Forest Service). YOU need to participate by writing letters, sending e-mail messages, and making phone calls.

To stimulate our club members to do this, we recently passed a motion to have a drawing 4 times a year. Each letter, e-mail, or documentation of a phone call will count as a ticket in the drawing. ## SAGEBRUSH FLATS ADOPT-A-TRAIL

 RUN, by Joel WilsonOn Saturday, April 5, ten people and six vehicles showed up for NM4W's Adopt-A-Trail run. This trail is the NM4W's first Adopt-A-Trail with the Forest Service and is called the Sagebrush Flats Loop. Attending were Mark and Jennifer Werkmeister, Mark Wolf, Kevin McTavish, Phil and Carol Kennicot. Pat and Sue Brady, and Charlie and Joel Wilson.

Unfortunately, it snowed the night before and the graded road to the start of the loop was muddy. However. it was fun to slide around in two wheel drive on the way there, and Mark Wolf did more driving sideways than straight ahead. At the trailhead we split into three groups of two each a half mile apart in order to speed up the work. Pat
brought his full size Ford truck, and because we want this trail to be open to all vehicle sizes, we asked him to go last to make sure that the trail was cleared enough.

Just before lunch we previewed a trail that my dad and I and members of the Sandia Jeep Club had found a couple years ago. We call it Roller Derby. It's a short but sweet trail that needs some clearing but not too much work, and we hope to do a run on it this summer. Members of the Sandia Jeep Club have already driven the first 100 yards and it's only about a half mile long.

After lunch we continued along the loop. I thought that people would be close enough together to see each other and make the turn back onto the loop, and that our tracks would be discernible in the grass and dirt, but this was not the case. The group became separated and this resulted in a ten minute delay. I didn't think that it was a big deal, but according to some members. I'm now a cowbell nominee. Oh well. somebody has to have it.

Within a half hour we arrived at the toughest part of the loop, where there are some rocks to drive over in the streambed. Pat decided that his truck was too big to go the standard route, so he straddled the rocks. However, in doing so, he found a small but sharp rock for his passenger rear tire's inner sidewall, and in a hate at first site relationship, the tire literally tore apart. This wouldn't have been a big deal, except that Ford has this crazy gimmick now where you need a special wheel for their new trucks, so the spare wheel Pat had bought didn't fit correctly. So it was necessary to take the flat tire off of its rim, take the spare tire off of its rim, and put the spare on the original rim. This took quite a while because Pat's tires are load range E. ## TANK TRAP RUN, by Joel Wilson

"Dangit" I said as I gazed out the window of my room. "Its going to be a bad day and no one will show up for the run!" There was a light blanket of snow on the ground, it was cold out, and the sky was dark and cloudy. It was Saturday, April 12, the date scheduled for the Tank Trap run, and if there was one thing that could ruin that run, this was it. Snow on rocks doesn't work, and with this knowledge, two people had already called to say they were not coming. Half an hour later, I learned that the roads were solid ice, and it took us about an hour and a quarter to get from our house to the meeting place. We were supposed to meet at nine, but understandably, everyone would be late.
However, by nine-thirty the day was looking better as the ice on the streets had melted and six vehicles and eight people, Mark Wolf, Eddy McLain, Scott Brunwasser, Charlie and Joel Wilson, Tom Hurt, and Lloyd Swartz and his friend Leroy had arrived. Everyone was in good spirits and looking forward to the run, so we set off.

To our great surprise, the storm was all around us but it hadn't snowed much on the trail. In fact, on the first stretch of dirt, we were making a tiny bit of dust! Once off the county roads there was a little mud, but not enough to slide around in. There was only enough to make some tracks, tracks that John Bell of the Sandia Jeep Club (soon likely to be renamed) was able to follow. He met us at the first obstacle.

The first obstacle is no problem when dry, but our tires were slightly dirty and the rock was damp. I slipped off a rock and needed a quick tow backwards, but on the second try had no problems. Tom followed with no problem, but Lloyd took a little longer. His Montero was too long and his frame had some kind of weird tendency to attract solid rock. Must be the Japanese metal. His Montero was also covered with slush which was profuscly wetting the rock. It was almost as if his vehicle was crying, and it had reason to. We finally had to attach one winch to the back and move it sideways, while
his winch pulled him forwards. It took a while, but he got away without damage.

Within an hour the rocks and dirt had dried off and the clouds were even beginning to break up. During lunch Mark and Tom talked about a tworoll crash they had seen when driving up on the ice on 1-25, as well as a few other vehicles they saw that had also crashed or rolled, all from going too fast. Lunch over, John said he had to be back in Santa Fe by 1 pm, but he was having so much fun that he had to stay just a little longer.

There is a lot of sagebrush in the canyon and it took a while for us to pick a line through it all. Every once in a while we would come upon a rocky section. At first they were easy, but they became progressively more difficult until we arrived at the first of two spots with chicken routes. These spots are short but fun sluices of boulders and solid rock. The first one had only one line, and Eddy. Scott, and I all made it easily although Scott rubbed his T-case skidplate a little hard (read, high centered) on one rock. The second sluice had two very short but tough options, and Scott and I scraped over the right one while Eddy took on the left one. The narrowness of the left one forced Eddy to spend some time on his rims, but no harm was done and everyone was enjoying the trail.

Directly after the second chute comes the dam for the first tank. There is a bypass to the right in order to circumnavigate a multi-foot deep mudbased and scum-infested pool of water, but it's not easy. It favors short wheelbase vehicles because of a sharp left turn down a steep slope. And what makes it extra cool is that this entire traverse around the dam and pool is on solid rock. There is a natural shelf in the rock followed by a spot to drop off. It gets a little spooky when the front end drops off the ledge at the bottom, and the passenger rear often lifts off the ground a little, especially in a CJ5. Then the rear end drops down and everyone hits hard, but the rock is so hard that the surface barely scratches.

Everyone cleared this section with ease, although Lloyd had some fun by taking an alternate route and a decent sidehill. By this time John was being seriously paged by his wife, it being around 4 pm , so he left for Santa Fe. After the dam, the canyon bottom becomes solid rock, and

there are some fun boulders to crawl over, one of which Lloyd and I both got stuck on and had to be winched off. However, by this time it was late. so we decided to take an escape route. Tom found an old road out of the canyon below the dam. which was a good and casy way out. And maybe the rest of us should have done the same, because the other route was steep and rocky and caused some problems. I became hung up on the rear diff on a rock with a notch in it, and could go neither forward nor back. Four people tried to rock and push me backward, right, and left, but nothing would work so I winched off. Lloyd slid off the line at the bottom and put an eight inch deep indentation into his IFS diff skid plate to add to his rocker panel damage. After some jacking to get him off the rocks, he was winched out of the canyon. Finally. Mark slid off the line as well, but with his rear end only, and with his rear bumper wedged in the rocks he couldn't move. He had no problem with clearance, however, so I winched him forward and he was up in a snap. Everyone was then up, and it was now about six-thirty, meaning that the last few hundred yards of the trail took two and a half hours.

The day turned out to be a success after all. The hardcores loved the trail. and want to see the rest, which becomes quite a bit tougher, so there will be another run come the end of May. I think that this was one of the toughest drives that Lloyd has ever done. and he must be commended for his impressive willingness to subject his vehicle to pain. and for driving the whole trail as far as the group went that day. Almost everyone had some trouble, and Tom and Eddy were the only ones who werent towed, winched, or pushed. We have rated this trail Extreme (X3 on a scale of 5), suitable only for modified vehicles. Unfortunately. it was late ( 7 oclock) when we tinished, but it was a good day, and in the tume it took me to write this. my dad and I have decided to hold the next Tank Trap run on May 31 when we will complete the trail. See you there!

## TRIP TO THE SAN RAFAEL SWELL OF UTAH 4-6 APR 97, by Bob Telepak

Bob Telepak. Bob Norton, and Charlie Rushing visited the San Rafael Swell area west of Green River. UT on these dates. We left t-70 and mile
marker 105 and headed south. Saw a hillside that seemed to be covered with very shiny objects that reflected light, like glass. It was actually large selenite crystals laying all over the hillside. Some pieces were clear. others white, many quite large. Later that day we found a "boulder" of selenite, almost as big as a car.

Next we went to the Copper Globe Mine area where we explored several of the mine tunnels and found rock samples of malachite and azurite. Camped there that night. It was VERY cold. Luckily, the old miners had left a huge stacked pile of firewood (probably originally used to fuel a boiler to run steam-driven drills). The pile is about 8 ft tall and 100 ft long. This made a great camptire for us to huddle around. The two 5 gallon water jugs we had froze nearly solid that night.

The next day we explored more of the mine area and documented (GPS, mapping, photos) an alternate road. This data will be sent to Emery County officials to help fight SUWA closures.

Then we visited one of the best Indian pictograph sites I have ever seen at an area called the Head of Sinbad. The pictures have the sharpest artistic detail of any. Anyone interested should contact Bob Telepak for specific directions on how to find them.

Finally, we visited the area of the southern portion of the San Rafael Reef. Near Morgan's cabin (an old uranium mine site) above the mouth of Chute Canyon a road goes up to the top of the reef. The motorcyclists call this the Behind the Reef Trail. Closing this road in particular and the whole area in general is a prime objective of SUWA with their HR-1500 hill. We documented the first part of the road and a side road about $11 / 2$ miles long to a very colorful side canyon that makes for great hiking. In mid-May we plan to finish documenting the remainder of the road, and many others in the area.

## TRIP REPORT OF THE NORTHERN ESCALANTE AREA OF UTAH 18-20 APR 97, by Bob Telepak

This was a solo trip by Bob Telepak to check out the area in anticipation of a trip on May $1-4$ by a higger group to see the area and document roads for Garfield County.

The area visited is west of the Colorado River and included BLM land, Glen Canyon National Recreation area, Capitol Reef National Park, and the northern area of the new Escalante Grand Staircase National Monument.

I came in from the southeastern area by going through Hite and then south to Bullfrog. A very big graded county road heads northwest from Bullfrog and parallels the eastern edge of the Capitol Reef following the Waterpocket Fold. This is a spectacularly beautiful area. The reef is similar to the San Rafael Swell reef, but even more colorful in many areas. A side road off the county road goes to a view and hiking area to a double arch right in the reef about 2 miles away. This would also be a really neat place to camp.

Instead I went west on a road toward Starr Springs and camped in the desert. I was looking for a rockhounding area marked on a Utah recreation map. Finally found it and found selenite crystals together with fossil shells called Henry Mountain sea shells or "devil's toenails." There are lots of them there lying on the desert floor.

I then went back to the county road and followed it north to the Burr Trail. This is a very famous trail to the city of Escalante to the west. It is paved for much of the way, and the rest is a graded county road. The east end goes right up and through the Capitol Reef itself. This is a MUST place to see if you like beautiful scenery!

At the top of the reef I took the 1st dirt road to the north. a 2 -track NP road with a " 4 -wheel drive road" sign. It is really a very easy road you could do in a 2 -wd pickup. It goes 3 miles to a parking area. A $1 / 2$ mile hike takes you to a viewpoint on the top of the reef where you can look about 20 miles north and 20 miles south along most of the reef. This is another MUST place to visit.

Back on the Burr Trail going west, I then took the Wolverine Loop road. It is another graded county road. Found a road up to a mine site on a mesa that has some 4 -wd challenge due to severe erosion and big boulders. Plan to "work" on it on subsequent trips and document it for Garfield county.

Along the southwest part of the "loop" are 2 fenced areas to the west that are the Wolverine Petrified Wood Restricted Area. It is illegal to collect the petrified wood samples in these areas. The ground is almost covered in some areas with petrified wood, some parts of trees many feet in diameter! This is another MUST place to visit, even if you can't take samples! Outside the fenced area there are also smaller petrified wood samples in many areas.

By this time it was after 7 PM. I went back to the Burr trail and continued on it through Long Canyon, a very deep and beautiful canyon. I am surprised it was not included in the Capitol Reef National Park. Now it is part of the new national monument. Highway 12 from Escalante to Torey goes up to 9400 feet. This makes for a nice cool drive in the summer, but was downright COLD now. From there I went back to Green River and then to Moab. I would recommend that people not wanting to make this high elevation loop drive south from Notom on Highway 24, follow the Waterpocket Fold road to the Burr Trail, take it west through Long Canyon - and then come back out the same way.

## Jaws of Death Work Party, June 6-8

That's right! You've heard about it and now you have another chance to actually experience it yourself! The one, the only, the Jaws of Death! The club has planned another work party to continue the creation of some world-class rock crawling right in our own backyard. This will be a flexible weekend with directions given below so that you can come out anytime during the weekend and give the workers a hand.

Some of the members will be leaving after work on Friday with others arriving early Saturday morning. We will be camping out on the ranch both Friday and Saturday evenings with a return to town planned for Sunday afternoon. The plan is to leave the camp down on the ranch no later than 9:00 a.m. to head for the canyons. We need as many workers as possible as there is a lot of work to do. If you plan on coming, you will need to bring the correct "implements of construction". Please call Mark Werkmeister for information on what to bring in the way of tools.

Remember, this area contains some pretty difficult 'wheeling so bring appropriate vehicles
and a correct frame of mind. Lockers and larger tires are recommended if you want to play in the canyon but we have plenty of open seats available if you want to leave your truck back in camp (camp is accessible in stock vehicles) and "Jeep-pool" down to the trails.

If we have a respectable turnout of people who demonstrate a willingness to work, Mark has promised to have some liquid reward back in camp for the tired, sweaty, dirty laborers. With that, here are the directions for reaching camp.

1. Take I-40 to Los Lunas, turn west on Highway 6.
2. Approximately 15 miles west of I-40, turn left to the new Valencia County Landfill. If you enter the Laguna Indian Reservation, you have gone a little too far.
3. Head for the weigh station/gate house for the landfill. Just short of the weigh station is a gate on the right hand side. There is a chain with several locks on it. Our lock will be the brand new "Master" combination lock. The combination will be " 2477 "! Be sure to lock the gate again behind you.
4. Take the new graded road toward the landfill. After 5.6 miles, take a right on a dirt road. The road runs mostiy west.
5. After 1.7 miles, take a right at the Tee intersection.
6. After 0.8 miles, take a left. You should be able to see an old road climbing the mesa in front of you. After 0.3 miles, you will cross a major dry wash.
7. After 0.9 miles, veer right on the old road up the mesa. After climbing for 1.0 miles, you will pass through a gate in a fence line as the road flattens out and heads across the mesa.
8. After 2.2 miles, take a right. In about 0.6 miles, you will pass near an old well head (A capped pipe sticking out of the ground about six feet).
9. 0.5 miles after the well head, take a left on a very faint two track heading west. If you come to the edge of the mesa, you have gone a little too far.
10. After 1.4 miles, take another left and continue to the edge of the mesa.
11. You will descend the mesa on an old roadbed cut through the rocks. From the mesa's edge, you will see an old windmill and ruin in below and in front of you. Follow the road to the windmill.

12. At the windmill, take a right. Camp will be 1.5 miles down the main set of tracks that head generally north. If you get lost, holler for help on the CB. We will be monitoring Channel 4 .

Remember, this camp site and these trail opportunities are on PRIVATE LAND. We are there at the good pleasure of the land owner. Make sure we continue this great opportunity by taking great care of his land! Come on out, have a great time, and enjoy some great canyon rock crawling!

## Armijo Canyon, by Sue Brady

The trip to Armijo Canyon had quite a small group which actually worked in our favor. We left the Union 76 truck stop at 8:15 with Pat \& Sue Brady, Tom Hurt, Mark \& Joan Wolf, and Charlie \& Joel Wilson We headed west on 140 to exit 89, NM117. After a short pit stop at the Stuckeys, we headed south on NM 117 to the first turn-off to Pie Town which is a dirt road. Approx. 4 miles down the dirt road we turned east at the road to Armijo Canyon. There is a small sign for Armijo Canyon at the turn-off. The road goes in about I mile to a small parking area. From there we walked up the sandy road approx. $21 / 3$ miles to the homestead and well house. It was an easy walk and the canyon is very pretty. We ate lunch just above the well house under large pine trees and oak trees. On the way back we wandered about some of the small Indian ruins that line the north side of the canyon and also went to the Dittert site which is National Register. ## Copper Mountain Run Trip Report,

 by Joel WilsonOn Sunday May 18, my Dad and I met Pat and Sue Brady in Santa Fe at 8 am, and set out on the Copper Mountain run to explore an area that the BLM is planning to partially close. Our goal was to decide whether this area north of Dixon has anything of interest to four wheelers so that we can comment on their draft plan.

We met with a BLM representative in Dixon at $9: 30 \mathrm{am}$ to talk about the area and pick up some overlay maps. We then drove to the area and started out on some easy roads that follow washes and wind through the hills. A couple of hours later we found some interesting petroglyphs on a large boulder, but it is doubtful as to whether they are the work of Native Americans or of modern man. At this point we were following a loop that went through according to our fifty year old maps. As it turned out, the loop does seem to go through but no one has driven on it for at least a few decades, so we turned around and headed for a lunch spot.

After lunch we drove to the other end of the loop to see how far we could get. According to the map, there is a side road off the loop road that connects to a maintained road. Because the loop is almost invisible now (something only Pat Brady could see), we decided to try the side road. The road progressively became fainter and rougher - finally something with excitement! And it wouldn't have been a problem except that our Jeep refused to keep running. It was a hot day and the steep hills we were encountering were causing our Jeep to vapor lock. But it wasn't too big of a deal for the time being, and I was able to keep the engine at low RPM for the occasional set of boulders to crawl over.

Then came the hill. The road turned into a pack trail and traversed a steep side slope. Our levo gauge was reading about thirty degrees, and as the side slope became steeper, our Jeep began to slide sideways a little bit whenever I tried to go forward. After a closer look we found that the original road had climbed straight up the loose rock hill. With so much idling, the engine finally shut down as I tried to climb the hill, and I had to back down and sit for awhile while Pat tried the hill. Pat made it nine-tenths of the way up, and then resorted to winch power to crest the top. After pouring gasoline down the carb, our Jeep finally started and I began to crawl up the slope. But I went too slow, and was stopped a number of times before reaching the nine-tenths mark where Pat stopped. My winch did the rest.

From here it wasn' far to a more used road, but another problem arose. Where the shelf road climbed to another mesa, we came to a deep washout that had to be bypassed. As we were pondering the situation, we heard Sandia Jeep Club members complaining about some hills on the CB. It seems they were exploring the area to the south of us. With some momentum I was able to make it up the steep bank and go around the washout, while Pat dug out a path for his uphill wheels and drove by it, although not without some excitement. His rear wheel slid partly into the hole but momentum carried him through without tipping.

We ended the day at around $3: 30 \mathrm{pm}$, and explored only one third of the area. It seems that there are some interesting trails to be explored in this area, and we will make a return trip or two this summer so we can provide a full report to the BLM. Happy Trails!

## TRIP REPORT - NORTHERN ESCALANTE NATL. MONUMENT,

 by Bob TelepakThis trip occurred May 1-4th with Bob Telepak, Bob Norton, Arne Gjerning, and Charles Rushing participating. We began on an old mining road starting on the south side of Utah Hwy 95 at MM 67.4 east of Hite. Documented this road with GPS and photos and moved several big boulders using Bob's CJ-5 and a cable system.

Next we traveled along the Notom-Bullfrog road in the Waterpocket Fold of Capitol Reef National Park and camped off the Oak Creek Canyon road which we also mapped. Camping was cold and windy but made tolerable by a large campfire.

The next day we drove up the Burr Trail through the reef and down the Wolverine Loop trail past the petrified wood protected area. Found a mine road going up to a mesa. Used the same CJ5/cable technique to clear the road of several large boulders which we also were able to maneuver into washed out areas of the road to serve as fill. This took several hours. Camped that night on top of the mesa which appears to be an old oil exploration site with several drill holes. It has a great view for almost 360 degrees around.

The last day out we found 2 more even less used mine roads off the Wolverine Loop that we drove, "improved" somewhat, and documented with GPS and photos. This all occurred in Garfield County, UT where the county engineer has encouraged clubs like ours to drive and document and all roads such as this to help the county protect them from closure using RS-2477 against the offorts of SUWA.

Club Meets with BLM, by Mark Werkmeister
On Tuesday, May 27th, Mark Werkmeister, Robert Telepak, Pat Brady, Charlie Wilson, and Phil and Carol Kennicott met with the local BLM office to hear their latest decision on the club's request to use the San Ysidro Trials Area for the club's rock crawling forays. Ms. Jane Altweis from Rep. Steve Schiff's office also attended the meeting at the club's invitation. Representing the BLM was District Manager Mike Ford, Rio Ruerco Resource Area Manager Hector Villalobos, Recreation Officer Cathy Walters, and Public Affairs Manager Charna Lefton.

In a nutshell, the answer on the San Ysidro area from the BLM was still "No". Continuing a two year tradition of finding new ways to disprove the club's request, the BLM sited areas of religious significance for nearby pueblos and "scenic values" as the current reasons to keep us from using the designated OHV area for its intended use.


## Trip Chairman's Report: (Con't)

 The BLM stressed their desire to find a mutually agreeable area for the club to use as a high challenge play area and encouraged the club to look for such an area in the many acres of local BLM that has been designated as "open" for motorized use. The "open" designation means that we do not have to stay to existing roads and trails and can create challenge routes as we see fit. Unfortunately, much of the "open" areas do not meet the club's requirements for rocky terrain that is suited for our use or is checkerboarded with private land that makes access difficult if not impossible to acquire. The BLM agreed to furnish the club with the latest 1:100000 scale maps with all of the current land use designations applied to the maps to assist the club in finding a suitable area.The BLM expressed willingness to accompany the club on field trips/runs to find suitable terrain. We are working on scheduling some trips with them in the hopes that when they better understand what our club is about and what we and our vehicles are capable of doing, the BLM might be more cooperative and successful in identifying the type of landforms we desire.

On the darker side. Mike Ford clearly expressed a very distorted view of what constitutes a "road" and what RS2477 means in terms of public access to historic rights of way in New Mexico. It is very clear from the conversations that "RS2477" is a very "evil" concept to the BLM and that they intend on following the Interior Secretary's illegal directives on that subject.

In expressing "scenic values" as a reason to keep us out of the area, it would seem that they have clearly discriminated against motorized recreation. How can an area be "too scenic to allow motorized use"??? This discriminatory theme continued in their contention that "Yes, we know that YOUR group are truly good people BUT - we are worried about renegade individual 4 -wheelers if we open an area up the way you want it." This clearly shows an institutional bias against motorized recreation!! Renegade 4wheelers? What about renegade hikers, bicyclists, equestrian users, etce?

The BLM admitted that the club has other avenues to pursue in getting access to the
affected public land by paying for our own Environmental Assessment or legal litigation.

The proof of the BLM's willingness to work with us in a cooperative and good faith manner will ultimately be shown in the RESULTS that we see in the next several months. By RESULTS, I mean the successful identification AND designation of an area that has suitable terrain for our high challenge needs.

In addition to working with the BLM to identify OTHER possible challenge play areas and routes, the New Mexico 4 -Wheelers need to continue to weigh their other options in leveraging the BLM to appropriately manage the San Ysidro Trials Area and then vigorously pursue all means at our disposal.

## WHY RS-2477 SHOULD BE IMPORTANT TO ALL 4-WHEELERS <br> I have told you in the past about RS-2477, the 1866 law that appears to be the key to keeping open the roads we like to drive on - and the ones most threatened with closure by the government

## Dir. of Environmental Affairs Report: (Con't)

(BLM and Forest Service) and the object of major efforts to close by the Southern Utah Wilderness Alliance (SUWA) and it's newly spawned sibling the New Mexico Wilderness Coalition.

These groups want to turn millions of acres into complete Wilderness, where only hiking is allowed. In effect, they are trying to turn some of the most beautiful areas in the country into their private playgrounds. Specifically, they want to shut down 5.7 million acres of Southeastern Utah and 2.5 million acres in New Mexico.

They say their proposals are the "peoples' proposals." This is absolutely false. They are the proposals of an elite few who could not care less about limiting access to all but themselves.

RS-2477, put simply, gives ownership of roads to the counties they are in, regardless of whether the roads are on "just plain" BLM or Forest land, or within national monuments, and even national parks. Recently, the Forest Service acknowledged this ownership in Alamosa County, CO by agreeing that the Mt. Blanca road, all the way to the lake at the top, belonged to the COUNTY. This was a very important precedent that was sent.

SUWA and the Sierra Club are very afraid of RS-2477. and are continually trying to say it is not valid, just an "antique" 131 year old law. But it IS valid, just as is the much older Constitution of the United States!

Recently, there has been an effort in Congress to prohibit the BLM and Interior Secretary Babbitt from implementing regulations on RS-2477 without congressional approval. This has met with a ferocious media blitz by SUWA and the Sierra Club, claiming that this will result in a "Pave the Parks" effort by the counties.

Nothing could be further from the truth. The counties just want to keep their existing roads open. not pave them! Probably the most famous road they cite is the Burr Trail, which goes through Capitol Reef National Park. Guess what! Part of the Burr Trail is paved, but the pavement STOPS at the park boundary.

If you are interested in preserving the existing roads, trails, ways, etc that we love to drive and give us access to these beautiful and historic areas, then support RS-2477 all that you can. Get on the Internet if you can and join the Land Use Network (LUN). When you hear of a need to phone, e-mail, or write letters in favor of RS2477, please take the time from your busy day and DO it. We need your help. This is probably the MOST important political thing you can do in the next year.

Remember to write your letters.
Mt. Blanca is now open.
Flood Relief Bill has an RS2477 rider on it.
San Ysidro wants to meet with the club.

TRIP TO THE EL MALPAIS CONSERVATION AREA OF NM
25 MAY 1997, by Bob Norton
Due to uncertainties of schedules, three NM4Wheelers did not participate in the Treasure Hunt. However, breaking away for a day trip was possible.

Charles Rushing and I drove our XJ Cherokees. Arne Gjerning rode with me as his XJ rear Ring and Pinion was toast. We first stopped at the El Malpais Ranger Station on Hwy 117 to obtain some maps. From there we traveled into Cebolla Canyon, surrounded on both sides by the Cebolla Wilderness.

We were interested in finding some petroglyphs at the mouth of Lobo Canyon. We were ready to begin our hike in the general direction where we suspected they were located when a Ranger drove up. She was a young lady out to show a new recruit the all highlights of the area....entirely in one day, I think!

Anyway, she proved to be friendly, talkative and very hyperactive! She was pleased to show the three of us and the recruit the way to the rock art. The Ranger lady talked non-stop so we learned much of the area in a short time! The Pictograph panels were nice. We parted ways as she raced back to the bone-stock government issue little Blazer, equipped with one humongous winch on an equally humongous front bumper. Well used, I suspect!

From there we looked for the back ways into an area surrounding the El Malpais National Monument called the El Malpais National Conservation Area. A loop to take in West Canyon and Brazo Canyon was planned. Apparently so designated by Congress on Dec 31,1987 . I myself was previously unaware of this National Conservation Area designation.
"Allows compatible multiple uses in the NCA, such as livestock grazing and hunting. No mining or timber cutting" (and, I presume, no drilling).
"Vehicle use limited to designated roads." Yes, there was a handful of road closed signs at some short-cuts that may have been fun 4 -wheeling stretches. Most roads were on the maps and well used.

The limited multiple-use policies utilized in the El Malpais Nat. Conservation Area may be valid for certain other specific areas too. (That is, if they leave the primitive roads open too!). Pleasant scenery. The road was mostly 2WD. But, a muddy crossing of a wash and deep ruts in the road prove these roads may be close to impassable when very wet!

Next, we checked out an area targeted for wilderness designation by the New Mexico Wilderness Coalition (SUWA affiliate) called Techado Mesa. Darned if a road and trail don't show on the BLM's own map! Drove to the top of the Mesa and all the way to the end of the road at an intermittent lake. (Expect the USGS map will confirm this entire road too.) Arne diligently recorded the GPS readings. We took pictures to record the road, cows, etc.

4 -wheel drive low was helpful to crawl up a steeper stretch, but may not have been necessary at all with a more aggressive attack. Next, on top of the Mesa was a herd of grazing cattle! Now

the mesa was very pleasant, but no particularly unique geology or unique scenic qualities. We were uncertain as to the locations of other targeted areas nearby called "Cebolla Additions"

- likely a couple more mesas in the N.C.A.

What kind of scam is the NM Wilderness Coalition up to in calling Techado Mesa, complete with road and cattle, a wilderness?

I expect that much of the other areas targeted in NM also exhibit multiple-use. A large area targeted between Mt. Taylor and La Cabezon may be such an area. Worth exploring.

## TANK TRAP TRIP REPORT, by Joel Wilson

Another trail finished! Tank Trap is the second rock-crawling trail that has been completed in the Santa Fe area. Although there is more that could be done to Tank Trap, you can now drive from one end to the other. The first trail completed was Squeeze Play on Glorietta Mesa, which is just east of Santa Fe, and the next one to tackle, on June 29, will be Mission Impossible, also on Glorietta Mesa.

Tank Trap is a fun and challenging trail, and everyone at the run agreed. Attending were Gary and Chris Brown, Pat Brady, Kevin McTavish, Mark Werkmeister, and Charlie and Joel Wilson. The trail takes a long time to do, almost two days between the two groups we took over the trail, neither of which did the same section of trail. And, interestingly enough, this trip was composed of people who did not come the first time, and no one who came last time came this time.

We met at nine in the morning at the Santa Fe Outlet Center and were at the trail head within an hour and a half. We started out on an old road found by Tom Hurt which descends into the canyon bottom where the trail is. From there we continued on from where we had left off on the last trip. The tough stuff began right away, and Chris proved it when he broke his passenger side hub. He was done for the day, and decided to head back to town. Everyone quickly got some chances to exercise their rocker panel protectors on the hard and unforgiving rocks, and I put some good gouges in my transfer case skid plate.

Toward the end of the quarter mile of trail we did that day, there is a difficult section where we had to pile up some rocks in order to maneuver around a waterfall. The finished path was narrow and off-camber, but it wasn't a problem until the last obstacle, where there is a short and steep descent around a large boulder into the canyon bottom. I was the first one to try it, and there were not enough rocks piled to support my Jeep. The Jeep slipped sideways off of the rocks and became hung up on the driver's side rocker panel. The driver's side quarter panel also was squished, Everyone took some pictures, even me, after all it did look dramatic. Half an hour later, Mark winched me backwards into a more comfortable position. For the next fifteen minutes, many rocks were stacked to make a better path. After this, the drive around the boulder was no problem, but still exciting. Everyone else made it through all of the obstacles without getting stuck, but there was one problem to report concerning some environmental damage. Kevin had his new Commando out and running, and today would be his first day testing it on some hard core rock crawling. His Jeep was doing great on all of the obstacles, and with its impressive wheel travel and low gearing, he was making the trail look easy. However, there was one obstacle where a steep descent down a rock waterfall led to a pool of water, followed by a short and slippery climb out due to wet and muddy tires attempting to grip a slab of rock. Kevin's Commando decided it was time to relive itself of some fluids on the steep descent. After all, who wouldn't be nervous on their first time rock-crawling? The Commando leaked at least a pint of gas on the rock. I think an appropriate fine is in order.

It was a sunny and dry day for once, meaning no mud to hide the scratches. We were done for the day at three thirty, in time for everyone to get home in the daylight.

Gathered at the intersection of Highways 44 and 528 and chomping at the bit were Mark Werkmeister, Pat

Bob Norton, and new prospect Ron Zorn in a full size Bronco (Ron had two kids along but I didn't get their names either). During a quick discussion is was apparent that several vehicles would be making it a day trip as they had reasons to return Saturday evening.

We took off, passing through San Ysidro and Canon before turning off at Gilman and heading up toward the tunnels. Just short of the tunnels, we locked in and aired down and headed up the old road to the top of the ridge. The berms aren't getting any easier but everyone made it over without incident. We turned north up the Peggy Mesa Road and stopped for lunch in the meadows at the head of Deer Creek. ## ARROYO DEL PALACIO TRIP REPORT, BY JOEL WILSON

The Arroyo del Palacio is an area near Espanola managed by the BLM for many different types of recreation, including four - wheeling, mountain biking, and especially motorcycling and the use of ATV's. After talking with the BLM about the area on the phone, the New Mexico 4 -Wheelers decided to take a trip there on June 18 to check out the area and give the BLM an evaluation of our interest. Attending were Hector Villalobos of the BLM, Scott Brunwasser, Phil and Carol Kennicott, and Charlie and Jocl Wilson.

Upon reaching Espanola, we rendezvoused with Terry Rust, Michelle Stegner, and Tim Hodgkins of the Sandia Jeep Club, who could stay for the conference part of the run only, We discussed the area with the BLM for about an hour, including the possibility of building new roads! After this the NM4W's and the BLM Suburban took off to tour the area.

Arroyo del Palacio is a fairly small area, about fifteen square miles. It doesn't have very many

interesting roads in its lower half due to the flatness of the land. But the upper half is more interesting because there are some higher hills leading up to a ridge, where three or four roads take off in all directions and head down into the valley. The most interesting one is so steep that, according to the BLM, someone tipped their truck on its side in an attempt to traverse a washed-out section. We did not have time to try the road on this trip, but we plan on returning.

The scenery is fantastic from the ridge, making for a great easy and scenic day trip with fantastic lunch spots. The loop that we did takes a couple hours when dry, and the whole area could probably be explored in two full days or less. Most of the roads are not loops, and there are probably only a few loop possibilities. There are no canyons for rock crawling either. But the area definitely has opportunity and it is designated especially for motorized vehicle use as a play area. There are many sandy washes which dirt bikes like but there are also the ridge roads for the $4 \times 4{ }^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$. This is an area to keep in mind for future use.

## ELK MOUNTAIN TRIP REPORT, BY JOEL WILSON

A beautiful Sunday July 6 saw only two vehicles in the lineup for a trail rated easy to moderate in difficulty and extreme in scenery. Attending were Pat and Suc Brady and Charlie and Joel Wilson. It would be an easy going type of day on a trail that winds through the mountains between Pecos and Elk Mountain. It would also be a great day for Sue to try out her new truck, a good looking Mazda B4000. We stopped for gas at a Fina station and then climbed up, up, and up some more until we reached the trail head at close to ten thousand feet. The trail starts out with a bang, or rather a scrape if you don't have the height to clear a couple of large berms. But if you clear the first two you're set, because the berms only get smaller from here.

One interesting aspect of the trail is its amount of moisture. There are many puddles and small creeks running across the trail along the first section before you reach the stream crossing at the canyon bottom. We had lunch here in the lush green grass beside the stream. After this we
began to climb again until we reached the end of the shelf road where an un-bulldozed road takes off, The trail becomes steeper and steeper until one reaches the steepest and most difficult section. The slope is somewhat loose and has a couple of small ledges and some small moguls. But it was no problem whatsoever for Sue's truck, and we were at the top of the hill and eleven thousand feet in no time. From here the trail traverses a tippy slope and finds a few more mud puddles. The flowers in the meadows are beautiful as are the views of the snow-capped Sangre de Cristo Mountains.

The trail connects to the Elk Mountain road near the peak. We followed this road as it climbed another 700 feet to a beautiful 360 -degree view and cool, clean, and fresh mountain air. It was only two o'clock at this point, but the long drive home prompted our return. A great day on a great trail!

## MISSION IMPOSSIBLE TRIP REPORT, BY JOEL WILSON

Mission Impossible is always a challenge as the name suggests, but a fun challenge for those who like the adventure of a tough trail. Attending on that June 29th were Lisa Stuckey and L.P. How, Mary Langley and Jeff Lee, Pat Brady, and Charlie and Joel Wilson.

The trail was dry for the most part, but that doesn't mean it's easy! The boulders were as big as ever, and as we progressed along the trail, they only kept growing. But Pat found excitement right away when he pioneered a new route over a boulder the size of a VW Bug and some smaller mere big screen TV-sized rocks. He became high centered on his passenger rocker panel and had to be towed off. L.P. was behind him and used his winch for the job. But his Jeep wasnt heavy enough because the winch was dragging L.P. instead of Pat. That pig was wedged good! He was unstuck soon enough when he fired up the pony truck and helped the winch in reverse. Meanwhile Jeff took the bypass because although his Toyota has the clearance and wheel travel, it as of yet lacks the gears and lockers.

After this the trail is easy for about a tenth of a mile. and then the bypasses end. There is a huge boulder to crawl over followed by a squeeze through a $V$ notch. Everyone conquered this, so on to the next spot. A few more boulders later

and one reaches a tight turn around, over, and through yet more boulders. This obstacle will be the first of many of its kind. Next is a tippy section through some trees, and then the going gets really tough in another tippy section with some large boulders waiting to snag a fender or driveshaft.

At this point one is almost to Brady's Bathtub (named so because Pat was the first one through Flemingwood's Bathtub doesn't sound right), a smail pool of water that is almost dry now, but murky due to all of the cows that trudge through and probably defecate in it as well. The challenge is not in the pool itself but in the exit from the pool. There are two large boulders making a V to straddle, and we spent a couple of hours here piling rocks and winching the large boulder on the left into a more suitable position. The obstacle wouldn't be too difficult when dry, but with slick tires, the first two vehicles needed a few tries. Especially me. I was first, the guinea pig, and like a greased pig the rock could not get a hold of my tires. So I slipped and slid until the driver's side fell all the way into the V and the frame rail on the passenger side made contact with the boulder. Lucky we brought our pry bars! Wc had bought two pry bars - a 78 incher and a 48 incher - at a metal shop in Albuquerque just for trails like this. So far they had been used for prying rocks, but now a whole new concept arose: use the pry bars to lift me off of the rock and to an even greater side hill, then rock the Jeep while I throttle it and see if something goes. Well I went, and luckily nothing else did, although I thought the sidewalls would because the tires were wedged against the edge of the boulder at the bottom of the V. But they were so slick and muddy that the rock couldn't produce enough friction to tear a sidewall. However the whitewalls are now looking whiter than ever.

A few more rocks were piled to keep the sliding down, then Pat and L.P. followed up, over, and through. Jeff and Mary had stopped after the tippy tree section, and now L.P. had to go back to town. So it was just Pat and I bravely continuing on from where we had left off before. But we didn't get much farther, probably another hundred yards or so. After the tub, the trail enters another tippy section before making a fairly difficult climb beside a tree and over some
boulders. Being the leader, I again had the most fun when the Jeep quickly found itself at a 33 degree lean into a very sturdy and hard looking boulder. I backed off and some rocks were piled, after which the spot became only tight. The spot that I thought might be too tight - a sharp turn around a big boulder - turned out to be no problem at all, while the previous spot which I thought would be no problem ended up testing my nerve and needing a ramp of rocks.

The trail continues to be tight as it winds back and forth through the trees. A tight turning radius and short wheel base is helpful here, but longer vehicles should fit with a little more maneuvering. There are plenty of places to drag bumpers, differentials, and rocker panels, and on the last section we did I even scraped and dented the gas tank skid plate, something hard to do on a lifted CJ5.

We turned around at quarter to two and were back at Jeff's Toyota by two-thirty. The trip out was quick, and would have been really quick had Jeff not taken a fun route. But with a longer wheelbase vehicle, its hard not to. He found himself at a very steep side hill on the tight turn around, over, and through some boulders. His rear end would not slide around the rock on the passenger side, something lockers help with, and he ended up tagging the rocker panel and, with two tires in the air, needing a tow. Looks like rocker panel protection would be a good investment.

Well definitely be making a return trip at some point to Mission Impossible, but it may be awhile. It's a fun and exciting trail, and since it's short and half of it has bypasses, spectators who don't want to drive the trail are welcome. It was a great day and we made some real progress on building another great addition to our club's collection of trails.

## North Hatch/Poison Spring Canyons \& Henry Mountains, by Bob Telepak

This trip was taken the long 4th of July weekend by Bob Telepak, Bob Norton, Arne Gjerning, Charles Rushing \& his father, and Garry Brown \& his brother. The trip began with Bob Telepak. Arne, and Garry meeting at Comb Ridge and doing the Hotel Rock trail. Then we met the rest of the group and drove to Hite.

On a previous trip 2 weeks earlier Bob had found a trail near the Sunset Pass purposely "closed" by someone who had spread dead branches and trees across the road. The Hite ranger could provide no information on the closure. Closing this road was NOT part of the Orange Cliffs management plan. It is shown on a 1997 government brochure. The ranger continues to look into its status.

We drove from Hite to the southern Maze area and then visited the northern end of the road in question. In addition to trees across the road there was a very purposeful long pointed rock put in the center of the road where it could strike an oil pan. Not the kind of thing rangers usually do!!

We camped that night on the top of the Big Ridge in the area west of the Flint trail. The next morning we found 2 old mine roads that do show on old (pre-1976) maps and, like the Flint trail, go down some 1500 feet into the North Hatch and Happy Canyons. They have no closed signs, but would require some "road work" to be passable. Something to do on future trips.

We then went down the Flint Trail and took the North Hatch Canyon Trail to the crossing of the Dirty Devil River, which was very low. We camped that night in the western part of Poison Spring Canyon.

The next day we visited a petroglyph site in the canyon before getting back to pavement on Hwy 95. Since it was quite warm (actually very hot) at the 3500 ft elevation of the canyon. we decided to go up Mt. Ellen, the nearest of the Henry Mountains. This is a very long unrelenting climb to $11,000 \mathrm{ft}$ at the top. Although you knew you were in Utah, it looks just like Colorado with aspen and fir forests and even some snow banks at the top. The view is spectacular. To the west it looks along the entire Capitol Reef for well over 100 miles. There is a re-opened active gold mine near the top mining high grade ore.

We then returned to Moab. The next day Bob Norton, Charles Rushing and Garry Brown did the Moab Rim trail. Arne had to return to work and Bob Telepak had (another) flat tire so could
not go. Overall, it was a long and hot trip for this time of year, but everyone had fun.

The Monument manager wrote to me that Santa Fe was chosen because the BLM State Office was there and it was the state capitol. I believe that it was chosen at the (successful) urging of SUWA. But at least now, I can't prove it.

It is critical that as many New Mexico 4Wheelers attend this meeting as possible. You can be assured that the GAG organizations (like SUWA, the New Mexico Wilderness Alliance, and the Sierra Club) will be very well represented. We need to counter their efforts. They have been very successful in the past in dominating such meetings and we can't let it happen here.

We need to fight to keep the roads open in the new monument. We need to have a consensus of our views and opinions and probably should have one designated spokesperson to speak for all of us collectively. I nominate Mark Werkmeister since he is the SW4WDA President and has a lot of experience with such political issues.

Please make every effort to attend this mostimportant meeting. Maybe we can organize car pools or whatever to make the trip to Santa Fe easier.

## JRJW RENCRTS:

FARMINGTON TRIP REPORT, BY JOEL WILSON
This year's SWFWDA Summer Quarterly Meeting was held July 31 to August 2 in Farmington, New Mexico at Chokecherry Canyon for the first time ever. Farmington is a great place for four wheeling, and an ideal place to hold an event due to the proximity of the trails. Five different runs were offered ranging from moderate to extreme, and since we trailered our Jeep up to Farmington, we were ready to tackle the most extreme trails offered.

About nine NM4W vehicles showed up at various times during the meeting, and between all of us most of the trails were triumphed on numerous occasions, but not without damage or breakdowns. As far as I know, those attending were Mark Wolf, Mark, Debbie, and Jennifer Werkmeister, Pat Brady, Scott Brunwasser, Bob Norton, Berry Harrison; Tom Hurt, Alex Garcia, Jim and Tammy Werkmeister, and Charlie and Joel Wilson. My dad and I camped at McGee Park in the registration area (for free), with Mark Wolf, Scott Brunwasser, Berry Harrison, and Bob Norton, while the other members of our club paid for hotels or RV parks.

On the first day the trails started late at eleven oclock. Eager to tackle the trails, we unloaded our Jeep from the trailer only to find it sliding down the ramps with the front tires locked. Apparently the rear brakes were not working, so with the generous aid of Mark Wolf, we disassembled the rear brakes and saw them to be overly worn out. We rushed to Checker and bought new pads, but when we tried to install them, they proved to be the wrong size. The
second visit to Checker was successful, and by noon the Jeep was ready to roll.

Mark, Scott and ourselves decided to run the Waterfall trail, hoping that the group already on the trail wouldn't be too far ahead of us. As it turned out, the small group of seven or so vehicles was just starting the Waterfall itself, and one vehicle was still on Riff Raff. The ledges were taller than I had ever seen them on Riff Raff, but the Waterfall was the real challenge. There was a trickle of water running down the falls being just enough to wet all of the rock and create wet sand. The trail leader had already returned to town with some broken parts, and the next vehicle in line was winching too. Finally, a well set up Profab Cherokee from Arizona made it, as did a green early Bronco with Marlin Crawler gears and a $145: 1$ first gear with an automatic, and a local extended cab Toyota pickup with 35 's.

Our group of three was up, and being first, I experienced just how difficult the conditions were. I made it up both Riff Raff and the Waterfall, but they both gave me a similar amount of troubie, be it because of the loose sand or wet surfaces. Mark made it up Riff Raff but was stopped on the 'Waterfall when his front locker decided to quit pulling and instead gave a loud popping-snapping-whining sound with each internal slip of the unit. I thought whining wasn't allowed, Mark. But glory be and God save the Commando for Mark had installed his Ramsey winch. This time we used our winch to pull Mark, but there would be a next time. Scott was up next, and although Riff Raff was no problem for him, the water on the Waterfall made him slide into a high-centered position about half way up. A short tug off of the ledge and he drove the rest. The next day he took the same trail and made it without a hitch, almost. Locker trouble would be the name of the game that weekend.

The next day my dad and I did the Marble Rock trail with Mark Wolf, Mark Werkmeister, and Bob Norton. Marblé Rock is actually a single obstacle rather than a complete trail, so we started out romping through many different playgrounds, all of which had near vertical climbs that required a bump, and with a CJS it was all more than exciting. But no matter what you're driving, the same can be said for the Marble Rock climb. It's a steep and slippery sucker with the major challenge being at the top,

where the driver is faced with a difficult 90 degree turn up two ledges and very little room for error. Most people took a sky-happy line, raising the passenger front at least a foot off the ground. I was the only CJ5 and was able to take a safer line by doing a fifteen-point turn between ledges. All this time Steve Statham of JP Magazine was there and taking many pictures of the action. I think he was impressed. Mark Wolf had picked him up at the airport earlier that day.

That night we heard about Berry's near rollover on Ballhanger along with a little door ding. But the worst news came from Scoth, who had broken his rear air locker on the Waterfall. Two others had done the same that day, one of whom had already broken his air locker four times. An ice cream social hosted by Dairy Queen was a great way to end the day.
On the last day, my dad and I did the Intimidator with Pat Brady and fifteen other vehicles. Mark Wolf rode with Pat due to front locker problems. This would be our first time on this trail, and from the start it proved to be intimidating. The very first ledge was the worst for me because of a short wheelbase and a lack of traction. However, there was a CJ5 in front of me, and watching him make it without breaking or rolling was a comfort. However, he had wider axles and was able to straddle a tough section in the canyon bottom. I fell in but didn't become wedged. The CJ3A behind me wasn't as fortunate. On that note the CJ5 in front of me also had trouble on the climbs out of the canyon. He broke on the second tough climb and lost his place in line. He had the spare parts to repair the Jeep, but now I was ahead of him. This bothered me because I wanted to see how he would fair on the Crap Shoot. After all, when I hear about a CJ5 on the Crap Shoot, it's either associated with a wheelstand, something broken, or a rollover. But we had everything out of the back and the heavy stuff in front of the scat, so we were well prepared.

But before we made it to the Crap Shoot, there were still a few tough obstacles to overcome. I made it up the switchbacks and arrived at the base of a huge ledge. Two big boulders with a gap in between big enough to lay over in is a more accurate description. With helpful spotting and the right momentum, I was up. Then came
an optional double whammy where I never found the right line and had to bypass. I then watched the other CJS do it easily but by taking a major sidehill.

After waiting about an hour for the vehicles in front of me to get up the Shoot, it was my turn. On this day, most of the vehicles had a tougher time with the ledge just prior to the Shoot. Luckily, I didn't slide left to become wedged between the ledge and a twelve foot drop as others did. And the Shoot, although it looked vertical, was being crested by almost every vehicle so far. Then it was my turn. First try: too slow, the rocks kicked out. Second try: I made it up the ledge with a small bump but thought my front end was slipping sideways, so I backed down. Everyone yelled at me because I supposedly had it and it wasn't slipping. Third try: third time's the charm! I bumped it a little harder and kept left, scooting up to the top. First short wheelbase up, two to go. The 3A didn't make it after a couple tries and decided to winch after coming close to a rollover. The other CJ5 bumped it and went up the middle on the first try. Finally, a few vehicles toward the end with automatics showed off by easily rolling up the Shoot.

As the rest of the group crawled up the Graffiti Bowl chute to grab a free Mountain Dew from the Mountain Dew Jeep, the last vehicle in the line-up, an FJ40, broke it's rear driveshaft at the pinion on the ledge just prior to the Crap Shoot. Pat Brady was second to last and tried to tow him up, but his rear wheels were locked. Pat jumped into Harold Off's garage man's suit and helped take apart the rear end. With the help of our jack and other various equipment, the Toyota was eventually rescued.
"Wow, what a trail" was all I could say at the end. The steep hills and side hills coupled with the nearby cliffs were intimidating and exciting. The dinner afterward was great, as was the ice cream social the night before, and we left that night to arrive home early the next morning so as to revisit the Copper Hills area near Española the next day and prepare comments for the BLM's road designation plan. The Farmington event was a success, and I look forward to the next time they host a quarterly meeting.

On August 23-24, we had a pre-run in Red River, NM. Attending were Pat \& Sue Brady, Tom Hurt, Jack \& Steila Sierra, and Michele Reed. The weather was beautiful with the exception of timely rain showers. We camped off of Mallette Road to the right in a field of grass. Saturday morning we left for Pioneer Creek. The trail was pretty easy with a few exciting spots. Pat \& Sue went on Greenie Peak later that afternoon. They said the four wheeling was easy and the views were beautiful. Sunday morning we drove up to Middle Fork Lake. This trail was harder than the others. There are switch backs going all the way up the trail. Sue's truck donated a little bit of paint to a branch, but other than that it was an enjoyable weekend.

## Blanca '97-Wow!, by Mark Werkmeister

On the weekend after Labor Day, the New Mexico 4-Wheelers made their annual pilgrimage to the high country paradise known as Mt. Blanca. This year's trip was special for two reasons. First, it was the first time that the club has made the ascension of Mt. Blanca since the agreement between the County, the Forest Service, and the motorized community to keep the Lake Como Road open all the way to Blue Lakes was finalized. The trip was a little sweeter this year just knowing that the view from the high alpine basin at Blue Lakes would be available to all. Secondly, this was the largest group from the club that had ever made the annual ascent. This year's version of the trip featured no less than nineteen vehicles, seventeen of which belonged to club members. Making the trip this year was trail leader Mark Werkmeister and Jennifer, Pat \& Sue Brady, Mark \& Joan Wolf, Derren Owen, Bonnie Owen (in her own Jeep), Kevin McTavish, Tom Hurt, Lloyd Swartz and guest Leroy, Paul Thompson and guest Howard Sanger, Garry Brown, Guy and Carolyn Conway, Michael Conway, Pat Slattery, Berry Harrision, Scott Brunwasser, Bob Norton, L.P. How and Lisa Stuckey, Sandia Jeep Club member Michael Maloney, and prospective member Charles Carrillo and guest Ken Sanchez.

We left the trailhead promptly at 9:00 with many of the members having camped at the Great Sand Dunes National Monument campground the night before. We quickly determined that there was one club on the mountain ahead of us but they only had four vehicles along. As the group started climbing the switchbacks up Blanca's flank, a distress call came over the CB from

Michael Maloney. His new rear axle housing had rotated due to the spring pads not being welded securely. Brady Welding Service to the rescue! Pat gave up his spot up front of the caravan to go back and help Michael and soon had him back up and running along. We picked up Bob Norton on the trail and were soon at Jaws 1. Lloyd had camped up on the mountain and was waiting for us on the top side of Jaws I. This first obstacle was captured without much fuss or trouble, including Chris' open differentialed (but very cool diesel-powered) CJ.

Onward and upward! Jaws 2 proved to be a little more difficult with several of the slightly wider Wranglers getting high centered on the breakover rock. Lloyd's Montero and the open CJ again had to be tugged and several others required a bit of the "human factor" in terms of some pushing on the rear bumpers. The stretch between Jaws 2 and Jaws 3 is getting harder with several more challenging sections in addition to Jaws 2.5 . Lloyd's Mitsu again had to be towed off of Jaws 2.5 after he got himself pinned between a rock and the steep drop-off on the edge of the trail.

We caught the other club (Oshwego Jeepers from Denver) at the base of Jaws 3 . They were nursing a balky electrical system in a FJ40 and cut a tire on the towing Bronco while hauling it up and out of the way. Mark plugged the cut in the sidewall and then the NM4Wers started challenging Jaws 3 with several folks opting for the easier bypass. Berry Harrision had the Scout up above the obstacle when his fire went out. His battery did not seem to be charging as we could jump start his truck but it wouldn't fire again if it stalled. We started him several times and then he crawled up the trail toward the lake under his own power. After about half the club was up, Mark took off to lead the first half of the group upwards while Pat Brady brought up the second half,

While setting his tent at the lake, Mark got the cail that Berry had stalled in a narrow portion of the trail and no one could reach him to jump start the Scout. Mark went back down to try and jump start him but couldn't get the Scout to fire at all now. Finally, the Scout appeared at the lake under tow from the Scrambler. By this time, Pat Slattery's starter had decided that it had enough with the bendix jammed into the flywheel. Pat Brady and Michael Conway teamed up to haul the CJ5 up to the lake and it was parked next to the dead Scout.

After the campsites were selected and the tents erected, most of the club headed around the lake towards Jaws 4 and the road up to Blue Lakes. Several folks stayed behind to work on the Scout and CJ5. Jaws 4 proved to be very slick judging from the many attempts most made to get up its mud-slickened slope. By the time the group was descending from Blue Lakes, it had started to rain and Jaws 4 assumed its full stature as an obstacle to be
reckoned with. Mark Wolf found an errant rock with his passenger side rocker panel with some damage (to the Commando, not the rock) resulting. By the time everyone got back into camp, the Scout had been repaired (corroded cable from battery to solenoid) and the CJ5's toasted starter had been removed so it could be tow started the next morning

The weather slowly cleared and the large pile of wood that the group had brought from home was stacked by the community fire. The hilarity grew as the fire burned and the club enjoyed the camaraderie that makes these club campfires so special. The high altitude and many hikes back and forth between vehicles started taking it toll and members started drifting off toward their tents.

Morning dawned clear and crisp (but no frost!) and everyone packed up their camp sites and waited for the sun to finaily make its way over the peaks and into camp. The trip down was pretty uneventfil with Jaws 2 providing the only slowdown as several vehicles found the breakover angle to be a bit too much again. The group was back down at the trailhead by noon but lingered quite a while as we refilled tires, repacked belongings, recounted tales, etc.

Mt. Blanca again lived up to its reputation for being an almost perfect trail for our club. The scenery is spectacular, the trail is difficult (but not overly so), and the campfires are magical. Put the date on your calendar for next year, weekend after Labor Day, Mt. Blanca!

On Sunday, August 17, six vehicles met at the Santa Fe Outlet Center for a day run on the new Blowhole Loop trail in the Caja del Rio area west of Santa Fe. Tom generously offered to be tail gunner for this run.

The beginning of the trail is relatively easy and flat, but deep ruts must be negotiated and Alex took advantage of the opportunity to find out just how much clearance his new Toyota FJ40 has. Leaving the flats, we started up a rocky streambed section that leads to a switchback road up to the top of the mesa. With extraordinary attention, everyone got up what Joel and I consider to be the most difficult section of the trail without a problem. As true tour guides, we trail leaders dutifully pointed out the Two Tires Shrine along this part of the trail. It is a truly remarkable sight to behold the two large truck tires, lying in a field with their yellow-orange sides like large flowers reflecting the brilliant sunshine of a summer day. The magnificence of this site is surpassed only by the Four Tires Shrine, also on the Caja.

Upon reaching the mesa top, the trail levels off and winds through a pinon-juniper woodland, becomes very rocky as it reaches a low knoil, then descends to join the main road traversing the mesa. A second urgent call reached the ears of the trail leaders at this point, indicating a multi-vehicle problem. When we had turned around and reached the scene, serious attention was being focused on Tom's Jeep and Alex's Toyota. We learned that Alex, in his continuing education efforts to determine his clearance by Braille, had high centered on a large tree stump that the rest of us had managed to avoid. Tom was following Alex and, of course, stopped to help. While examining the stump carefully tucked beneath the Toyota, both smelled antifreeze and both ran to open their hoods to find the leak. Tom found it first, and while Tom was busy rummaging around for some stop-leak, Alex managed to dismantle the stump and free his vehicle. This was not without environmental cost, however, as Alex's encounter with the stump caused a large black widow spider to become homeless.

It was Tom's water pump. We all chipped in to supply water and ice to the overheating vehicle, and since Tom's rummaging yielded no fruit (figuratively speaking), Guy again came to the rescue with some stop leak. Moving on, we checked out the blowhole, a truly impressive nearly vertical, natural volcanic shaft about 150 feet deep and 30 feet across, and then had lunch enjoying the view of Santa Fe and the Sangre de Cristo Mountains to the east.

The rest of the trip was surprisingly without incident. Tom's engine was holding out, so we went out by way of Tom's Trail and successfully navigated another steep, rocky hill climb. To our disappointment, however, we found that the most difficult ledge climb on Tom's Trail had been eliminated through the trail building efforts of other users. After conquering Tom's Trail, we returned to the highway, dusty but happy after a good trail run. Thanks go to Guy Conway for being always ready to get the rest of us out of trouble.

## Hill and Dale Trail Trip Report, by Charlie Wilson

On Sunday, October 12, eight vehicles met in Bernalillo for a day run on the new Hill and Dale Trail in the Jemez Mountains. Attending were Charlie Wilson (the trail leader), Scott Brunwasser, Charles Alexander, Jim Norton, Robert Clark and his sons Cameron and Trevor, Kevin Cox, Tom Hurt, and Mark Wolf. Scott courageously offered to be tail gunner for this run.

This run is considered moderate to difficult for stock vehicles and goes through some very pretty country. Brush clearing along the old logging road loop was recently completed by members of NM4W and the Sandia Jeep Club. After airing down, we started out by climbing the old Peggy Mesa road. The road was as rocky as usual and the only problem was when Charles (Scott's friend, newly transplanted from Connecticut) high centered his stock Wrangler on one of the berms and had to be towed off. Charles soon learned the benefits of momentum and slid over most of the rest of the berms on his skid plate without assistance. Kevin was trying out his 37 th Jeep, this one a stock CJ7, and also found that he was caressing the tops of some of the berms but had no trouble on this climb.

Reaching the top, we crossed Peggy Mesa without incident and soon arrived at the trailhead where we met Mark and Tom. They had been scouting the area the day before for elk, and camped overnight. There was still a sprinkle of snow on the ground and Tom informed us that it was 25 degrees in their camp that morning. Starting down the Hill and Dale loop, comments of appreciation were heard on the radio for the beauty of the area and the efforts of those before them in smoothing the tops of the berms. Robert's newly outfitted and lifted Scrambler did well on the berms and throughout the trail. After lunch in a wide part of the canyon, we proceeded into the jungle section, where a perennial spring-fed stream creates a thick mat of vegetation with vines hanging from all the trees. Having mastered the principle of momentum by this time, everyone made the V -shaped stream crossing with no trouble. The trail changes character at this point by winding down a dry, south-facing hillside with one very tight, downhill turn. Having been warned by the trail leader, everyone made the turn without problem.

Crossing the stream again at the bottom, we began the long, two-stage climb back to Peggy Mesa. This climb can be a challenge because of the sidehills, loose rocks and moguls, and the fight against overheating in summer. The first stage hill climbs 540 vertical feet to a saddle, then drops down 140 feet to a valley, then climbs 600 vertical feet to a ridge, for a total climb of 1140 feet in a little over a mile. As the trail leader was explaining that the second climb was tougher because it was longer, a voice came over the radio asking "How many climbs are there?" It seems that Kevin's Jeep was stalling due to carburetor problems. Fortunately, there were only two. Robert was pleased

that liffing the his engine back to a level position seemed to have solved his carburetor problems, but everyone saw engine temperatures rise on the climbs even though it was not very warm out. The moguls seemed easier than before and everyone made it up with little problem.

The rest of the trail was supposed to be an easy cruise out, but problems seem to occur when least expected. A large and nasty looking mud hole had formed in front of a tall, steep berm. Not looking forward to a prolonged vehicle cleanoff effort, the trail leader and most of the crew took a convenient bypass. However, the last three vehicles in line decided to tackle the mud/berm combo. Kevin was first. He got through the mud all right but high centered on the berm, and more rocking than usual was required to get him off because of the mud-slicked tires. Wolfie was next and, having seen Kevin's problems, he decided to apply the momentum principle on the berm so he wouldn't get high centered.

Charging through the mud and sending a wall of muddy water over his hood, he hit the berm squarely. Accounts of what happened next vary and will no doubt be embellished over time as the incident passes into legend, but by the time he got to the top of the berm, the muddy water draining from his Commando was accompanied by a healthy stream of radiator coolant. It seems that Mark's flexible fan had lived up to its name, probably due to a combination of biting into the muddy water streaming into inis engine compartment and forward thrust from hitting the berm, and had gouged deeply into the radiator. By the time the trail leader had learned of the incident on the radio and returred to the scene, a large crowd had gathered around a man kneeling on the ground in front of a radiator, peeling away the damaged heat exchanger fins with a pliers, bending back the broken tubes, and maintaining a fixed grimace on his face.

As is his duty, and because the incident involved the club's esteemed President, the trail leader immediately checked the area for environmental damage. The stream of radiator fluid was clear rather than green, suggesting that it did not contain antifreeze and, therefore, was not causing environmental damage. On the other hand, not having antifreeze in your coolant when camping in 25 degree weather was sufficient basis for a cowbell award. Acting as self-appointed deputy in the absence of the sheriff, the trail leader reviewed these options with the culprit, and strangely declining credit for the coveted cowbell award, Mr. Wolf explained (or claimed) that he had clear Texaco antifreeze in his coolant, thereby qualifying for an environmental damage fine rather than the cowbell award. These issues will have to be taken up by a jury of peers at the next club meeting. To Mark's credit, however, he made sure that all damaged radiator parts were picked up before we left the scene. Not to forget our intrepid tail
gunner, Scott Brunwasser was the last to go through the mud. Having learned all there was to know from the attempts and misfortunes of his two predecessors, he cleared both mud and berm cleanly and without incident.

The rest of the trip was without further incident. With the help of a can of stop leak, Mark's trail repaired radiator got him safely to the trailhead. Having greatly enjoyed the day's outing, everyone (with the possible exception of Mark) headed happily toward home.

Hope all of you that could sent in your Visions Kits to the Grand Staircase \& Escalante National Monument planning team by the deadline of October 31 st. Even if you have not visited there personally, if you do not help define how it is managed NOW, you will not get the chance to visit it.

The next important battle is again in Utah, this time the San Rafael Swell. The BLM is making a Proposed OHV Plan that, as it stands, has closed down over 200 miles of trails in the Swell to all motorized vehicles. The public comment period has been extended from NOV 14th to the 31 st .

EIk Mountain Trip Report, by Charlie Wilson
On Sunday, November 9, six vehicles met at I-25 Exit 290 for a day run to Elk Mountain northeast of Pecos. Attending were Charlie Wilson (the trail leader), Scott Brunwasser, Pat and Sue Brady, Charles Alexander, Kevin Sturmer, and Chris Webb and Keely Bosch. Although Scott again courageously offered to be tail gunner for this run, as was to be seen the order of march varied considerably throughout the day because of the unexpected road conditions.

Although the weather had been warm, clear, and dry for over two weeks, this day it was cold and started to snow. Because of the snow, we decided not to tackle the back way up the mountain but go on the main road. This road is easy for high clearance vehicles if dry, but today the snow covered a layer of ice that raised the rating to difficult and beyond. Things went smoothly until we started our engines. Then the trail leader noticed his radio was not powered. Despite his lack of ability to provide verbal encouragement, the trail leader managed to get the crew to the Fina station near Pecos without loss. There he discovered a flown fuse, which was quickly replaced thanks to a replacement from Scott. Although the crew, led by Pat Brady, was getting restless at the delay and threatened mutiny, a bloody scene was averted when the radio came on line again.

After airing down and locking up at the trailhead, we started up the mountain. Although not planned as such, this turned out to be our club's first snow run of the year. Kevin, freshly from Minnesota with a stock Trooper II, considered it a spring day and coped nicely with the weather all day in only a flannel shirt. The rest of us were properly bundled up for the intermittent snow that continued all day. Chris and Keely, emerging from their triumphant run with us the week before at the Jaws of Death, came in their well-outfitted Toyota pickup. Charles Alexander joined us in his newly lifted, but open, Jeep Wrangler, after

having conquered the ups and downs of the Hill and Dale Trail with us in October. On this run the stock vehicles did just as well as the modified ones because the snow was not deep and the main challenge was ice traction.

On the first real hill the trail leader lost traction and slid back down twice. While the trail leader pondered his next attempt, Pat tried it and crested the hill by hitting it faster and keeping up momentum. Charles went up next and also crested using the same technique. The trail leader went next and as he crested the hill, Pat and Charles continued on up the trail. Stopping to watch the remaining crew members, the trail leader saw first Kevin, then Chris, and then Scott make the grade. As they were walking back to their vehicles, Kevin noticed traces of coolant laced with pink "environmentally friendly" antifreeze on the snow. Trying to think positively, he nevertheless found a big splash of pink beneath his engine. While he was fixing the hole in his heater hose with the help of some hose clamps from Scott (Scott saved the day a second time!), we raised Pat on the radio and he came back down to help. The repairs were nearly done when Pat and Charles arrived, and we again started up the trail.

Soon after negotiating the steepest hill on the trail we came upon a pickup stopped in the middle of the road. The driver was a hunter caught by the snow and trying to get down the mountain. He was in a highly excited state from sliding around the steep switchback behind him and said there were two other trucks blocking the road around the curve, chaining up. We had lunch by the side of the road, and finally the trucks came down followed by another truck and two ATVs. The trucks had all chained their front wheels, which helped considerably on the icy descents. As the bachelors in our party swarmed around the cute girls on the ATVs, they learned (among other things) that there were eight more vehicles slipping and sliding down the road behind them. After a brief deliberation, we decided that with such a traffic load we would not make it up the mountain that day, and started down.

The descent turned out to be the most exciting part of the run. We quickly reached the steep hill and found it blocked by the three trucks at the top and the successful slider, who did not have chains, stuck in a ditch at the bottom. Pat decided to take his Bronco down to pull him out, and passed the five vehicles in front of him by creating a bypass route. He started down the hill slowly, in low gear and pumping the brakes, but because he forgot to release his parking brake, he lost control of his rear and slid down the hill, recoiling from the roadside slopes like a pool ball in slow motion. After Pat pulled the truck out, the remaining vehicles came down one at a time. The trucks with chains did well, although one slid 180 degrees and had to come back up the hill and start over. The members of our crew, all without chains,
managed to get down with little damage. The trail leader killed his engine almost immediately after takeoff, and wound up sideways three times on the descent, but managed to stay pointing generally downhill. Charies and Chris made it easily and without incident, although Charles also killed his engine from braking too hard. Kevin came down quickly in slalom fashion, and wondered where the tree branch on the road came from. It was not there before his descent. Scott navigated two \(90+\) degree spins and managed to bend the radio antenna on the back of his Wrangler but also made it down like the rest of us, if not gracefully, then at least with little damage.

The rest of the descent was made without incident. Keeping the vehicles in low gear and accelerating to keep the wheels turning when they began to slip worked because the hills were not as steep. Sleet was falling at the trailhead when we aired up, and we all enjoyed the extra fortification from a fresh batch of W\&Ws from Scott's generous supply. Although we didn't make it to the top, we all enjoyed the challenges of NM4W's first snow trip of the season.
