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Meeting Minutes

Our first meeting of the new year was held in the Mid-High room at Heights Cumberland Presbyterian Church. It was standing room only at one point. But luckily, Chuck found some chairs in the corner and everyone got settled into a seat. Mark Werkmeister said that he was calling the meeting to order at 7:00 sharp, but it more like 7:03 by my computer, for the sake of keeping things official and all.

Secretary – Lauri Rector: Why is it that no one will let me read the meeting minutes? I'm a very good reader and some of you could probably use a 5 or 10 minute nap before we get down to business. Please give this a good long thought before you vote this down at next month's meeting. I reminded everyone in attendance to be sure and note their presence on the appropriate sign-in sheet. I also had a print-out of the members' points-to-date (being

the computer genius that I am) so they could check that out after the meeting if they wanted to.

Treasurer - Paul Thompson: We have \$2,410.79 in the bank. We donated \$200 to Road Runner Food Bank and they sent the club a note of thanks.

Vice President - Jeff Rector: He said that he had no fines, but there were several members that objected to this, seeing as the Sheriff had a major break on the last club run. Just to fill you in on some of the highlights of the inconvenience that this break caused to the other trail riders: Jeff had to winch onto Pat to get pulled over the obstacle and then have Pat hook up the tow strap to get Jeff up a very steep hill. This only worked half-way; Pat had to unhook, drive to the top of the hill and then Jeff had to winch onto him again. Jeff was able to drive all the way back to the staging/camping area on his own. He fined himself a nickel for this major break on the New Years Day run, which was probably the difference between Pat's u-turn fines and Jeff's fines. I tried to argue that he wouldn't have broken if Pat and Mark hadn't encouraged him to "load-up" the Torque Converter. Mike Coe then commented that it "unloaded" in the rear end. remembered, with the help of others, that Wolfie was late to the New Years Day trail run that he was leading! (And luckily, I never heard Wolfie try to blame Joan for his tardiness). Not only that, but this was going to be his first time driving most of these trails, and he didn't even have a map! Luckily, Glenn had one to give to him. Wolfie left a lot of people standing around that morning worrying about what we were going to do that day if he didn't show up - NOT!!!

Trip Chairman – Jason Lavy: Past Trail Rides: New Year's Day run at Gordy's Hill, or the 1st Annual NM4W New Year's Eve Bash. (I liked the name Mark Werkmeister gave it while sitting

around the camp fire on New Year's Eve " NM4W's 1st Annual Rock'n Roll New Year's Eve Run"). We had great weather on Saturday. Pat Brady led the "really big tire" group (37's and up). Wolfie led everyone else. Heath's Sammy had a smoking clutch, but his lockers helped him get through the day. This group's trail had neat topography and some old homesteads. We had a good bonfire on New Year's Eve and a killer pot luck (especially for those of us who happened to get the hotter peppers in the stuffed pepper dish that Kristy and Mike brought). Most of us celebrated the Nova Scotia New Year, which occurs at 9:00 pm Socorro time, and that was better suited for the majority of the group. I heard that there were only 4 people up at 10:00 pm, but they all headed to their camper shortly after.

Upcoming Events: Frank G. Whiston will be leading a day ride to Gordy's Hill on Saturday, January 28th. This will be for the "tweeners" (this is a newly coined term and I have high ambitions that I can be a part of this group some day), those that have 33" to 35" tires. Meet at staging area at Gordy's Hill at 9:00 am (and I'm sure that Frank will be on time – unlike Wolfie).

Chile Challenge!!!! This is SWFWDA's winter quarterly meeting and is on February 22nd – 25th (4 whole days!!!). There are usually about 300 vehicles in attendance (which makes for 600+ people). Lots of trails to choose from for each day and they range in ratings from easy to extreme.

Cliff Meier will lead some moderate trails in Las Cruces from March 17th to the 19th for those who can't make the Chile Challenge, or who just want to go again. He will lead trails for 33" tires or smaller.

Chuck Peeples is planning a tentative run in the Jemez this Saturday, January 14th. Meet at the Conoco at 550 & 528 at 9:00 am. He will send an e-mail to everyone the afternoon of Friday the 13th to confirm (since this is being written after the run – I would like to let everyone know that Chuck was able to lead the run!!!). If Chuck isn't able to do the run, Ron Hyman would like to have a back-up run to Cedro Peak. Meet at the Ranger Station at 9:00 am.

Director of Environmental Affairs - Bob Norton: Tellico OHV Area; Forest Service is proposing restrictions which would limit use or close trails. Comment period ends on 1/13/05. sharetrails.org and choose to accept some alternatives. We need to try to get some comments to them. This is an excellent off-road area (Jeff and I have been wheeling out there many times while we lived in Virginia and it does have lots of awesome trails and is well used by lots of different OHV groups and people). In Colorado, the Continental Divide Scenic Trail is being discussed as changing to a hiking trail only, no motorized OHV organizations vehicles will be allowed. suggest separating trails between motorized and non-motorized. The comments period on this ends 1/17/05. Brian Hawthorne with the Blue Ribbon Coalition has been in New Mexico all week meeting with BLM and various other people for the OHV coalition. Several land activists from all over New Mexico met and discussed off-road activities in New Mexico. We need to try to "shake hands" with more coalition people so that we have a better opportunity to voice our suggestions. suggested by Joanne Spivack that areas south of Mountainair be opened up. Mark Werkmeister reported that the NM OHV Alliance had a board meeting last Monday evening with Brian Hawthorne. Brian feels strongly that New Mexico underrepresented in off-road recreation, considering the opportunities in the state. Mark said that we have very organized groups in our various sports and recreation in the state. NMOHVA is very young and was formed to be an umbrella alliance for all types of off-road activities and groups.

Bob Telepak talked about the "Taking Liberty" article in Range Magazine. Google search Range Magazine Fall 2005 – Taking Liberty if you want to read it. It talks about the Wildlands Project, which wants all people to live in less than 1% of the land. The rest of the land would be wilderness. Government is also a part with their Gap Analysis Project. This project wants all of the National Parks, Monuments, and Nature Preserves connected to each other with wilderness. It wants to find the gaps and fill them in. Dr. Bob believes that this is a very factual article and several people agreed. Every time a resource plan comes out from the

BLM, it proposes areas to be accessed only by hikers & horseback riders. Resource Management Plans - part of the plan on what should be closed. These people are infiltrating in all kinds of ways -2001 in the Klamath Basin of south-central Oregon, they shut down farms for the endangered sucker fish. Agricultural irrigation of the Klamath Lake was lost and farmers went out of business and the area turned into a dust bowl. This doesn't mean that there has to be an endangered species living there, just be a habitat that an endangered species could exist and survive in. In rural Utah, spotted owls were brought in just so that they could say that the there are owls here and then they were able to get the area closed down. They moved the owls from area to area that they wanted closed down. These owls ended up dying from all of this moving around! (now how many of us are running out right now to sign up to be involved with a group like this?) Only congress can make wilderness areas, not the president, not the BLM, and not other various groups.

Mark Werkmeister brought up that we do not have an assigned delegate for the SWFWDA and we need for someone to step up and volunteer to represent the Club at the Winter Quarterly meeting. We could vote on it next month.

Program Chairman – Jerry Marx: Not Present, no raffle tonight.

Historian - Laurye Tanner: Not Present

Webmaster & Editor - Glenn Bontly: Nothing to report.

Old Business: The Club is hosting the Summer Quarterly 2006 in the Ouray/Silverton, CO area.. Mark Wolf said that we should have the specific location by next month's meeting. The trails are starting to be selected. The date has been set for July 27 - 29th; the All-4-Fun event ends just a day before the Summer Quarterly starts.

New Business: Mark Werkmeister was contacted by Robert Auge about co-hosting the 4X4 101 around the 1st of April. Wolfie made a motion that we agree to do it again this year. And his motion was seconded. Werkmeister explained to our guests and new members what the 4X4 101 was all about. We do seminars on basic 4-wheeling (tires, getting unstuck, lockers). Then we take participants through an obstacle course in new Jeeps and Trucks that are supplied by Auge's. Then we can play (and get strapped in my case) afterwards in our own Jeeps. You can read more about this in April and May Trail Tails in 2004 and 2005.

Leon Duggar volunteered and was voted to be SWFWDA delegate at the Chile Challenge. I did challenge his ability to be awake and at the meeting by 7:00am. He took offense to this!?!?

Mike Coe asked about having a club garage sale this spring. He was thinking sometime around this 1st of April, until we voted on doing the 4X4 101. Please think of dates for a vote at next month's meeting. I think that I heard Mike volunteer Kristy Ohnesorg's house for the location.

Jeff Rector (our lack luster sheriff) announced that we have guests present at the meeting that are eligible to be voted in: Ron Hyman was the 1st victim. We also agreed that we could vote in Jim & Debbie Farrell, even though there are related to Chuck Peeples. Both were voted in with lots of applauds and welcomes. Paul Thompson, our club Treasurer, loudly announced the amount of dues that they owed and asked them to promptly give him their checks (I hear that on Sunday he will be doing a lot of modifications to Mary's new Rubicon – check him out at the Chile Challenge to see what mods these dues paid for).





The big tire group was for those with 35's or larger and small tires included all below down to stock. What to do? As my mind was racing to make a decision for which group to go with, Mark asked for a show of hands for the big tires, so that he could get a good idea of how many rigs would be trailing him. What the heck! I raised my hand and went with the big guys that day. It was a great day, but I definitely did not want to tackle anything more difficult than Coyote Canyon trail that we ran that day.

I returned to Gordy's Hill for the New Year's Rockin' Weekend where Pat Brady headed up the driver's meeting that Saturday. Once again, we split into two groups, big and small tires. This time, Pat explained that the first trail he would be running was suited for 35's, but the next one may be a struggle for that size. Danger, Danger at Gordy's Hill by Mike Bilbo, BLM, Socorro Field Office

While on a visit to various areas with persons who may submit an special recreation permit application, we stopped today, 1/31/06, at a location just south of the Quebradas Backcountry Byway named Minas de Chupadera on the Loma de las Canas topo map. This is apparently an abandoned mining area and looks to have been worked in the 50s or 60s. At one location is a derelict, shotup tanker trailer, maybe 10,000 gallons, and two rectangular concrete basins for mineral processing. This location has waste rock piles that have nice specimens of azurite and malachite, and so people park here often and there is a kind of turn-around casually developed here. A lot of off-road enthusiasts also visit here and turn around.

So we did the turn-around and parked. In the middle of the small flat clearing I saw a hole that wasn't there a few weeks ago. So I walked over and looked in, noting wood splinters from what looked

like 1-inch plywood. I couldn't see anything so did the guy-test of dropping in a fist-sized rock. About 3 seconds went by before I heard a distant ka-thoom and splash.

I then took two great big giant giant steps quickly back, because apparently I was standing on a PLYWOOD and DIRT covering of a deep vertical shaft - the covering with plywood and gravelly dirt is only about 4 inches thick!!! The hole has appeared because of vehicle tires stressing out the old wood. So the thing is failing. I couldn't tell how big the opening is as the ground all around is very smooth there, so I decided to assume it's big.

There are other areas there with big waste rock piles indicating other shafts and adits. So it's a very dangerous situation, isolated from our office, where many Backcountry Byway visitors arrive to collect mineral specimens and hike the area. When I returned to the office, I notified Mark Lane and Brian Bellew. Brian had Sabrina Flores and I call the district hazmat person who said we should call David Sitzler, which we did. He advised us he will look at the site, and to go right away back out there and flag the site.

I went back out with 4 T-posts and plenty of flagging tape and cordoned a large square area around this feature.







President's Report By Mark Werkmeister



Member Spotlight: Mike Coe by Joan Wolf



How did Mike Coe get from being a technical writer in Virginia to being a four-wheeler in New Mexico? "Fate intervened," says Mike. And not once, but twice.

In 1998 at his company parking lot in Virginia, Mike noticed a lifted YJ with New Mexico plates. He eventually met the owner, Ron Simkulet, a onetime NM4W member. Ron mentioned an upcoming event in Salida, Colorado that offered challenging terrain and lots of trails. At Ron's advice, Mike contacted Wolfie (also Ron's former work colleague) and signed up for the NM4W-hosted summer quarterly in Salida.

With his easygoing style, affinity for campfire lies stories, and enthusiasm for wheeling. Mike fit right in. He became an NM4W Associate Member and over the next several years ran with the club at Mt. Blanca and Moab. By 2004 Mike had retired, sold his Virginia house, and was a fulltime RVer. It was July 2004 at the Summer Quarterly in Fairplay when fate intervened again and in a most special way. Mike met Kristy Ohnesorg--and the sparks flew. They're now a happy, two-Jeep household and recently moved into a new home on Albuquerque's west side.

Mike actually qualified for full membership his first time out with the club. He'd gotten to Salida early so went on several pre-runs with NM4W. When Mongo (aka, Scott Brunwasser) sustained major Jeep damage on Carnage Canyon the first day, Mike hauled Mongo around for the duration of the event. From the passenger seat of Mike's TJ, Mongo led Iron Chest Mine twice and Carnage Canyon. Mike earned enough points to become a full member before the Sheriff even had a chance to explain the system!

Mike was raised by his grandparents in Olympia, Washington. He joined the Navy at age 18 and stayed in for 10 years. He was a Fire Control Technician, a strange title for something unrelated to fire suppression. He worked with radar and analog computers, high-tech stuff at the time. After the Navy, Mike worked at Boeing while earning his B.A. in Business from the University of Washington. Then he went east and worked as a technical writer for defense contractors and private industry.

For seven years, Mike "dropped out" of the corporate world and moved to West Virginia. He ran bars, worked as a roughneck, and did odd jobs. This is when he became interested in Jeeps. He was driving a '63 Chevy pickup in the mud and swamps and was often told, "You should get a Jeep." So he got a '78 CJ5 and started racing it in drags, hill climbs, and obstacle courses. (He's also owned a '79 CJ7 that became the tow vehicle for the racing Jeep, an '89 YJ, and his '97 TJ.)

About the racing, Mike explains, "It's a different kind of four wheeling back there. There isn't as much public land or trails." He enjoyed the mud/swamp area in the Caanan Valley, which has

since been closed off. "We called them swamps back then, now it's called wetlands."

After West Virginia, Mike dropped back into the corporate world as a technical writer, but this time he let go of the corporate ladder. He concentrated on doing his job and socking away for retirement. It was a joyous day in 2000 when he retired and became a fulltime RVer.

Following professional advice to set retirement goals, Mike set three: find the ultimate in fourwheeling, beer, and pizza. He's accomplished much in the four-wheeling and beer categories, but says pizza dropped off the list. He's visited over 100 brewpubs and the ultimate to date is Dick's Brewery in Centralia, WA. The owner makes his own sausage and bottles 36 varieties of beer, the most in the world. His state rankings for best micro-breweries are Washington, Oregon, California, Colorado, Arizona, and then New Mexico. Best in NM is High Desert in Las Cruces. They also have the best motto, "None of our beers suck."



And the ultimate wheeling? Mike's overall favorite trails are the Rubicon and Holy Cross. Highest ranking on the testosterone scale are Johnson Valley in California and Patzcuarro's Revenge in Las Cruces. He's run 90% of the Moab trails and likes them all. Future rides? Mike wants to do Sierra Trek and repeat Johnson Valley and the Rubicon.


These trails should be no problem in his beefed-up TJ. With Mike's money, Pat Brady recently

installed a stretched Rock Krawler suspension. He'll lead some trails and set up the group dinner meal. Hmm, which brewpub will it be?

Summer Quarterly Information by Mark Wolf

Ok, folks! This is what you have all been waiting for! A location for our Summer Quarterly!! Let's go with it! Everyone is encouraged to make their own reservations ASAP. Check out the website. This is a nice place and you can even bring your fishing pole! The following details were provided to me by Ed Kausche:

Mark,

I think Ridgway State Park is our best bet. They have bathrooms, showers, and a place for our business meeting and for the dinner. I am recommending that we go for the sites with the full hook-ups (Loop G) as they are only \$4 more and there are many more of them than for the sites that must share water and sewer. There is also an area with tent sites (Loop H) that is not far away. There is also BLM land just across the road from the park where someone can camp for free if they don't want any services. (They will have to buy a vehicle pass, \$5 per day, if they want to come into the state park however.) Loop F is also a full hook-up site and is located very close to Loop G. Loop F would be an option if Loop G were to fill up.

The full hook-up sites (Loop G) cost \$25 per night. This includes \$5 for a vehicle pass. The shared water and sewer sites cost \$21 per night, also including the vehicle pass. I believe that tent sites (Loop H) cost \$17 per night.

Each RV site can accommodate an RV (this includes motor homes, travel trailers, and pop-ups) plus one tent, or two tents. The tent must sit on the ground, no pop-up with another RV. Also, no more than 6 people (not including babies and toddlers) can inhabit one site.

There is no parking right at the tent sites (Loop H). They share one common parking area and the actual tent site is some distance from the parking lot.

Each camper must make his own reservations. This can be done by calling 1-800-678-CAMP (2267), or through the web site: http://www.parks.state.co.us/.

Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click on the green "Park Reservations Map" icon. This brings up a Colorado map with the campgrounds listed below. Click on Ridgway. This provides maps of the area and links to actually reserve a site.

New Mexico International Auto Show by Mark Werkmeister

We have committed to providing up to 25 vehicles for the Auto Show on April 23rd (that is the Sunday of the show). The vehicles need to be there by 9:00 am, and you won't be able to leave until 5 pm. Participants will receive a free ticket to enter the auto show inside the Convention Center.

Some people expressed reservation about the "show quality" of your vehicle. The promoters want to see "club" vehicles. If you are proud of your vehicle (and who isn't?), bring it on out and show it off.

This is a great opportunity to advertise our club with the enthusiast community, have a little fun, and maybe brag to a few strangers!

Here are a few things you need to know if you will be participating in the show:

- While on display, all show vehicles must have the positive battery cable disconnected and taped using UL approved plastic electrical tape.
- Proof of insurance (as stated in the Feature Space Contract) or pre-approved by show management waiver must be provided to the show office upon move in.
- A representative should be present during all public show hours, if possible.

- If the gas cap door can be opened from the outside of your vehicle, the vehicle must either have a locking gas cap or the cap must be taped. If the gas cap door can be locked from the inside of your car, then a locking gas cap is not necessary, but the standard inside gas cap must be taped.
- Cars using AC/DC converters must have the security system fuse disconnected to prevent the alarm from being accidentally set-off.
- Please provide in advance, a list of participant names that will be working in your display so they may gain admittance to the show for free, all show hours.

If you plan to trailer your vehicle to the show, the designated area to park the tow vehicles/trailers is located outside the Northeast Hall under the Marquette Street bridge at the convention center.

Trail Leaders and Tail Gunners by Glenn Bontly

As you know, we are hosting the Southwest Four Wheel Drive Association (SWFWDA) Summer Quarterly from 27 – 29 Jul in the Silverton/Ouray, CO area. Wolfie is the Event Chairman, and has several committees working for him to take care of the various details, such as registration, facilities, and meals. Our Trail Boss this year is Cliff Meier, and he needs several trail leaders and tail gunners to help with the trail rides.

"I've never led a trail", you may be thinking. "I'm not qualified to be a trail leader." Nonsense! Leading a trail is a piece of cake. The biggest thing is simply knowing where you are going. This is pretty easy in Colorado, cuz many of the trails are identified with signs. Besides, Cliff will provide you with the maps that you will need for your trail. GPS coordinates are also available for most of the trails, so if you have a receiver, you can just punch in the coordinates and follow along. In addition, you will likely want to pre-run the trail a week or two prior to the event.

So what else is involved with being a trail leader? Well, the first thing you need to do is gather everyone up for a driver's meeting. Introduce yourself and your tail gunner, announce the trail you are riding, the difficulty rating, and the CB radio channel. Inform everyone to keep the vehicle behind them in sight at all times and to announce to you if anyone has any problems during the ride that requires the group to stop. Although it's normally not a problem at these events, remind everyone that there will be no tolerance for alcohol on the trail. not by the driver or any of their passengers. Finally, remind everyone that they are totally responsible for the safety of themselves, their passengers, and their vehicles. Encourage them to bypass any obstacles they don't feel comfortable driving, although there won't be too many tough ones on the trails in this area.

Out on the trail, one of the biggest challenges as the trail leader is keeping the group together. In addition to everyone keeping everyone else in sight, this is accomplished by maintaining good lines of communication with your tail gunner. Ask the tail gunner periodically how the group is doing at the rear, and ask to be advised if there are any problems in the group (breakages or stucks). You may also want to designate someone you know and trust as a mid-gunner, especially if you have a large group.

Other than that, make sure you stop periodically for potty breaks, photo ops, and of course lunch. If you really want to impress your group, read up a little on the history of the trail and the area, and share this information along the way.

Okay, supposed you are just not comfortable enough to lead a group, but you think you will be able to handle being a tail gunner. What will you be responsible for? Your primary job is to keep the trail leader informed of the status of the group. If you see the group stopped in front you, immediately inform the leader. When making key turns during the trail, inform the trail leader once everyone has made the turn. You can also assist with spotting, if needed.

If you're still not sure about all of this, and would like some additional information, talk to someone in the club who has experience leading or tail gunning trails. I'm sure they will be happy to answer any questions you may have.

And remember, the trail leader eats no dust!

Responsible Four-Wheeling Mandatory to Save Recreational Opportunities

(For those of you who weren't able to make it to Auge's 4x4 101 this past weekend, you missed out on several good discussions, as well as test driving all the latest Jeep models. As space permits, I will share with you some of the articles from the information booklet that was used during the event. This first piece regarding Responsible 4-Wheeling comes to you courtesy of Bob Norton)

Some of you may be brand new to enjoying the rewarding experiences that awaits you in using your 4-wheel drive vehicle. Or, perhaps you already know that your 4x4 will allow you and your families and friends to travel backcountry roads and 4x4 trails to remote, scenic, historical, cultural, and other special places. And if the road is a bit challenging so that you must use 4-wheel drive, so much the better. It adds to the excitement and adventure!

We have been accustomed to the freely traveling the routes on public lands. But, times have changed. Extreme groups are fighting constantly to eliminate motorized access on these long used roads and trails. And these "closurists" have been quite successful in getting road closures implemented.

Why? Largely because they are well funded and most diligent. Too, many of us that enjoy motorized recreation have not spoken up to insist that these backcountry roads, routes, and trails really ought to remain open for our continued access and use. And perhaps, most importantly, Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) and Sport Utility Vehicle (SUV) users are suffering from a bit of an image problem.

We have all seen the TV commercials showing SUVs tearing across various landscapes, spraying rocks, splashing mud onto hikers, and so on. Is this responsible 4-Wheeling? Absolutely not! With the

excellent capabilities of our 4WD vehicles and with prudent driving and planning, it is completely unnecessary.

Land managers for agencies such as the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) are responsible for prudent management of the many and varied resources under their jurisdictions. But when faced with increased resource damage due to irresponsible OHV abuse, too many of these land managers are prone to take the easy way out. And that is to merely limit or close roads and 4x4 trails.

Many new management plans are currently being reviewed for our public lands. Keep in mind that those pushing the "closurist" agenda are an extreme minority of citizens. Inappropriately, they call themselves "environmentalists". Their wish is to greatly expand the elimination of motorized (4x4 vehicles, ATVs, trail bikes) and mechanized (mountain bikes) recreational users from public lands. Truthfully, the "real" environmentalists and conservationists are the majority of Americans. These are the folks that favor a balanced multipleenvironmentally responsible use and management approach. The land managers must hear from us.

Another element working to close roads are the minority of Off-Highway Vehicle (OHV) users that do not respect the land. Indiscriminate vehicle tracks that branch off from existing routes are selfish and certainly malicious. Such violations destroy the beauty of an area for all other responsible visitors. Damaged vegetation may take years to recover, perhaps not in our lifetimes. Cross-country travel should only take place in appropriate areas where it is allowed. That is, "OHV special use areas" or designated "open" areas.

Each of us that travels the backcountry must take the initiative to ensure that we keep our tire tracks on the existing roadways. We must adhere to proper camping etiquette. And, we must educate the public, our children, plus our "neighbors" children on proper OHV use on public lands. (Such education might just filter upward and change the ways of a few OHV derelict adults!) We will only

be able to slow significant further restrictions if we, the 4x4/OHV community, minimize or attempt to eliminate abuse. The slogans of an organization called TREAD LIGHTLY!" and the "Leave No Trace" program are most appropriate and serve as a guide as to how we should operate our 4-wheel drive vehicles. For example, attempt to climb a rocky ledge or cross a wet section on the 4x4 trail as slow as possible. Speed and spinning tires may damage the roadway and could break the vehicle. Going fast is rarely necessary.

Proper backcountry trail etiquette is very important to preserve shared use. Keep in mind that 4x4 drivers yield to all of the following users that are met on the trail, or whom approach at a faster pace from the rear: motorcycles, ATV's, mountain bikes, hikers, and persons on horseback. When 4-wheeling in desert or dry areas, offer muscle powered recreationists you meet additional water. They could be critically low on this necessity, in fact. Respect all other users and respect the land. Haul out your trash plus other trash you might find along the trail to improve the beauty of our lands.

So what can you do as a new owner of a 4-wheel drive vehicle or a novice 4-wheeler? Find out if the BLM and USFS are updating land management plans for areas that you like to visit. Write a letter to the appropriate Field Office Supervisors informing them that you are interested in traveling the backcountry 4x4 routes in areas under their office's jurisdictions. Ask to be placed on their mailing lists to be informed of management planning changes that will come up for public Write to your Senators Congresspersons to support OHV use on public lands when major policy changes are proposed by Federal land management agencies. Join an active 4x4 club, such as the NM 4-Wheelers. Join other organizations such as the "BlueRibbon Coalition" or regionally-specific organizations that promote access for all on public lands. Perhaps, join an Internet land access mail list to become better informed of current or "hot" issues.

It is up to each of us to do our part to insure future access on backcountry roads that provide so much satisfaction for our families and friends. Be more involved and informed in land access management

issues. But above all, recreate with your 4x4 vehicle in an environmentally-responsible manner.



The "Right Way" to Lift Your Jeep

It's been said that the current generation of the Jeep Wrangler (1997 – present) is the most capable trail vehicle available "right out of the box". But once you've mastered the easy trails with your stock Jeep, you will likely get an itch to tackle some more challenging stuff. If you want to crawl over bigger rocks, you're gonna need more clearance, which means you'll need taller tires, which means you'll need a lift! I am often asked for advice about the "right" way to lift a Jeep. If you flip through any of the popular 4x4 magazines, you will find a dozen (or more) advertisements for lift kits. Some consist of a simple set of spring spacers, others complex systems with a seemingly overwhelming number of pieces and parts. No wonder it's so confusing!

I don't claim to be an expert on lift kits, and I won't be promoting any particular brand of lift in this discussion. Instead, I will try to point our several things you need to consider when lifting your Jeep, based on what I've learned over the years, including my experience in building my own Jeep. Obviously, I will be talking about a typical (non-Rubicon) TJ Wrangler, which is what I drive.

The biggest problem with lifting a vehicle is that changing one component will usually affect (adversely) one or more other components. And the bigger the lift, the more pronounced these effects. The "right way" to lift your Jeep involves a thorough evaluation of your entire vehicle.

The primary reason for lifting a vehicle is to increase the clearance between the axles and the body, in order to install taller tires. A **body lift** is the easiest and least expensive way to achieve this. But in addition to gaining clearance for larger tires, off-roaders often desire enhanced capability as well. A **suspension lift** will not only provide increased clearance for larger tires, but also greater axle articulation and more ground clearance under the t-case skid plate. In order to keep the center of gravity the lowest, and to mitigate the adverse affects of lifting your vehicle, you want the least amount of lift you can get away with, while still fitting the new tires under fully-articulated axles.

Body Lifts: A 1-inch body lifts is cheap and easy to install. With taller body lifts (2-3 inches), your gear shift levers will be too "short", and you will have to modify you're A/C lines if your vehicle is so equipped. Body lifts do nothing to enhance the capability of your vehicle, but may be just what you need, in conjunction with a suspension lift, for that little extra clearance for the next larger size tires.

Suspension Lifts: Ranging from 3 inches to 8 inches, suspension lifts consist primarily of taller springs. Depending on the kit, it may also include a variety of other components, such as shocks, track bar relocation brackets, drop pitman arms, sway bar quick disconnects, longer brake lines, adjustable control arms, and various other pieces and parts.

Shocks: If you go with more than 2 inches of suspension lift and want to take full advantage of the increased travel it affords, you will need to install longer shocks.

Slip Yoke Eliminator (a.k.a., Short Shaft Kit): One of the biggest problems caused by tall suspension lifts (4+ inches) is driveline vibrations on the highway. This is the result of the extreme angle of your stubby little rear drive shaft. To mitigate the effects of this condition, you can install a slip yoke eliminator at the rear output of your transfer case. It will require a longer drive shaft, which will result in a decreased drive shaft angle.

Drive Shaft: If you install a slip yoke eliminator, you will automatically have to purchase a new rear drift shaft. Unlike the front shaft, the factory rear shaft does not have a slip joint. And since you just removed the slip yoke in the t-case, you must get a rear shaft with a slip joint. And while you're at it, have a CV joint installed at the front end. This will spread the angles across 3 joints, instead of just two.

Gears: Installing taller tires will have the same affect as higher gearing. This results in a slower turning engine and equates to a loss of power on the highway. You may want to consider installing lower gears in your front and rear differentials at this time.

Adjustable Control Arms: A suspension lift will change your pinion angles. If you install either

upper or lower adjustable control arms, you will be able to reestablish the proper pinion angle. If you have both upper *and* lower adjustable arms, you will also be able to adjust the fore and aft positioning of the axles as well.

Short vs. Long Arms: If you have tall springs (4+ inches), long shock, and lots of axle articulation, the "droop" side of the rear axle will rotate forward somewhat at full extension, effectively causing some (unwanted) rear-steer on your vehicle. Long arms will eliminate this problem.

Track Bars (front and rear): A suspension lift will change the angle of your front and rear track bars. As a result, it will laterally shift your entire axles to one side of the vehicle. To fix this, most lift kits come with track bar relocation brackets. An alternative it to purchase a longer or an adjustable track bar.

Sway Bar Quick Disconnects: Moving up to the front of the vehicle, in order to take full advantage of your taller springs and longer shocks, you will need to disconnect your front sway bar. For safety, you should reconnect it prior to driving on the highway. The most convenient way to do this is with a set of quick disconnects.

Brake Lines: With all of your new found articulation, you will likely have to install longer front brake lines, or at least brake line relocation brackets.

Steering Linkage: A stock vehicle has a nearly parallel drag link and front track bar. A suspension lift will result in an increased angle between these two components. And the larger the angle, the more pronounced the 'bump steer" effect. Bump steer is the movement of your steering when your springs flex up and down. To solve this problem, you can either install a drop pitman arm or a high-steering conversion. The high-steer kit is gonna be expensive, but the drop pitman arm is a weak link (I've personally twisted one into a pretzel shape)!

Axles: Depending on how tall of a lift you install, as well as how low of gears you have, and whether or not you have lockers, you may want to replace or strengthen the axle shafts and/or axle housings. The

front Dana 30 will stand up to a lot of abuse, depending on your driving style. The rear Dana 35C, however, is definitely a weak link.

Speedo Gear: If you change your tire size and/or your differential gears, you speedometer will no longer be accurate. With taller tires and lower gears, your actual speed will be higher that what your speedo indicates (i.e., can you spell speeding ticket?). To correct this problem, simply replace the speedo gear in your t-case.

As you can see, lifting a vehicle the "right way" is not a simple task. But if you spend the time and money to do it correctly, you will be much more satisfied with the results.



By the time we got done eating, Wolfie and the Explorer came up and we all took off (more of a

majority vote rather than me not caring if Mark and them got to eat or not).

We get to the dry river bed and go through the most challenging part of the trail (and the bumpiest) and then....I get on my CB and ask Paul if I missed a turn or something - I think that I would have remembered the last 30 or 40 feet in the pre-run. Yep, if it was really rough driving through it, backing up is even more fun, especially since I still haven't learned how to get on the better side of my reverse gear. Luckily, it was only me that had to back up. I get back on the trail and we all head up to the top of the Mesa. We make one stop during the ascent - good trees for a 10-100. At which point, I'm either being whined at or praised by the women drivers (who all were driving Rubicon's or had lockers front and back and were all much better equipped than I was).



We get headed back up the Mesa again and finally get to the where we would have eaten lunch. I brought no trash bags, so there was no trash pick up. I lead everyone down to the blow hole. Now, if you read my story on La Ventana ride from about a year ago, you'd have known not to follow me on foot, yet a lot of people did. How we did not loose anyone down the side of the mountain is beyond me. And, I learned something about the blow hole. On a very hot day, you can feel cool air coming out of it.

So, we do some more talking. And Wolfie let me know that he was going to go back down the hill and help the Explorer back out – the Explorer was

having electrical problems with the transfer case and thus the 4-wheel drive. What comes up next is a hill that I have never driven down myself. I have become very comfortable with down hill in my Jeep, but for some reason I wasn't on this afternoon. It looked more eroded than what I remember and there was a very low drop-off that wasn't there on the pre-run. I pulled up too close and then chickened out, but I couldn't back up very far. Just as I was going to unbuckle and pull myself up to be able to see beyond my hood, Don Walker came up and asked if I wanted a spot. Just as I suspected, I needed to go over to the right. Just beyond that I needed to go over to my left (Jeff pointed this out to me on the pre-run). And just like that I had conquered that darn hill. My co-pilot closed her eves and missed it all.



The trail took us through another dry, but not rocky, creek bed before we meet up with FR 24 that takes us over to the La Bajada Hill trail. We did get some rain while on this 11 mile leg (or is it 21 miles?), but not enough to keep the dust down (ohhhh – it so nice being the leader!!!). We were all spread out a lot. So much so that we lost a member at the left turn onto the La Bajada Hill trail and almost made me seem like a liar when I said we were like the Marines and we leave no man (or woman) behind. Betsy Gunderson got some directions from Chuck and Paul on the CB and turned herself around and found us. Those that got there soon enough walked over and looked out over the valley and the abandoned vehicle at the bottom of the cliff. After Betsy got joined up with us, we headed on down the hill.

Since I was the leader, I got to the air down spot first (go figure!!!). There are some nice trees there, but I didn't think the 20 or so cattle looked like they wanted to share any of that shade with us. So I stopped out in the open area. After several hours (or it just seemed that long since we were having to stand out in the sun), those that wanted air, but didn't have any of their own, finally got their tires filled up by the people that have their own air (and thank you so much for sharing!!!).

Finally, about 5:30 before we all headed to I-25 to go home after a very long, hot, but extremely fun day. Even the women that were whining before were telling me what a great trail this was.



Thoughts on 4x4 Navigation


When attending a club trail ride, it is a very comfortable experience. We have a trail leader that has taken all of the responsibility for knowing where we are going and how to get us back. Ahh, we can all just follow along and enjoy the scenery and/or the challenge of obstacles along the trail. Have you ever thought that you would like to revisit the area sometime on your own? Lets think about how we could figure out how to retrace these steps as a leader a month or two later.

Maybe it would be a good idea to record the path taken with a GPS receiver. Global Positioning System, or GPS, devices are wonderful instruments. They allow you to pinpoint your location to within a few yards, no matter where you are on planet Earth! How about looking at the scenery for landmarks that you can remember? Another thing to think about is looking at the trail itself. How well traveled is it? How does the apparent traffic level of the trail that you are on compare to other trails that take off from it? Oh, I know, let's mark a waypoint at each intersection where we would have to make a decision the next time we come. On top of that, I'll note the name of the waypoint and record something like "left turn at the Y with the rock that looks like a dog on the right." I think that I will even take a picture of the intersection with my digital camera. That way, I could use it and my GPS data to create myself a trail guide when I lead a trip the next time.

GPS receivers are great fun, they are very useful tools, and they are easily obtained at reasonable cost. But be careful! Don't rely on a GPS until you first prepare yourself with the knowledge and skills required to find your way with simple tools like a map and compass. Map reading and navigational skills are developed by practice. I would suggest buying maps of any area that you might be interested in returning to on your own or as a leader.

(On your own meaning in a small group, never wheel alone.) It is easiest to read a map if the map is oriented to the surrounding landscape. If you see a valley on your left, then the valley shows on the left on the map. You can do this by eye or with a compass. Lay the map on the ground or hold it Rotate the map until recognized horizontally. features on the ground roughly align with those on the map. With the map oriented, look around for prominent features such as mountains, valleys, lakes, rivers, etc. Make a mental note of the geographical features you will be traveling along and seeing during the day. If you keep the terrain in your mind, you will usually have a general idea of where you are just by looking around.

Topographic maps can be particularly useful to help orient using the surrounding landscape. Topo maps utilize contour lines to depict the 3-dimensional character of the terrain on a 2-dimensional map. Contour lines drawn on the map represent equal points of height above sea level. On multi-colored maps, contour lines are generally represented in brown. The map legend will indicate the contour interval—the distance in feet (meters, etc.) between each contour line. There will be heavier contour lines every 4th or 5th contour line that are labeled with the height above sea level.



Drawn Contour Lines

- Steep slopes contours are closely spaced.
- Gentle slopes contours are less closely spaced.

- Valleys contours form a V-shape pointing up the hill - these V's are always an indication of a drainage path which could also be a stream or river.
- Ridges contours form a V-shape pointing down the hill.
- Summits contours forming circles.
- Depressions are indicated by circular contour with lines radiating to the center.

A topographic map, by itself, isn't much good if you can't point to where you are on it. Similarly, a GPS unit isn't worth much unless you can read the coordinates of your location and then find that place on the map. That's happiness. Here's me... there's the river... there are these two hills... there's where I want to go. Most maps display latitude and longitude at the edges which can be used with GPS data in order to determine your location on it. Get used to working from map to GPS and GPS to map—with a little compass work thrown in for good (safety) measure and you're a 4x4 Navigator.

Summer Quarterly in Ridgway, CO An Update by Mark Wolf

As most of you folks know, we are hosting the SWFWDA Summer Quarterly in Ridgway, CO July 27-29, 2006. Cliff Meier is working very hard to make sure there are plenty of trails available for all who journey to the event. If you can help out, PLEASE contact Cliff at 281-3704 and sign up as a trail leader or tail gunner. All of these trails can be done in a stock 4-wheel drive vehicle. In fact, I believe all that is left is easy and moderate trails. The scenery there is spectacular! Cliff has excellent maps and guide information available for every leader, so don't be afraid if you've never been there. All that is asked of you is to make sure you pre-run so you know what turns to make when you lead someone else during the event.

Mike Coe has found a most excellent cook to cater our meal on Friday night, July 28th. Gas Saving Tips

Driving style has a big impact on fuel economy. Backing off can save big.

NEW YORK (CNNMoney.com) - You can get 35 percent better fuel mileage out of your current vehicle by using a device most drivers already have. That would be your right foot.

Most drivers agonizing over the cost of gasoline fail to realize the enormous impact their driving style has on fuel consumption. During the last run-up in fuel prices, we wrote about Edmunds.com's tests of common fuel-saving driving tips. Some common tips, it turned out, had little or no effect on fuel economy. (Edmunds.com provides data and content for CNN.com's automotive Websites.)

For example, using the air conditioner at highway speeds had no appreciable effect on fuel economy compared to rolling down the windows.

Keeping your tires properly inflated, while important for safety, has only a small effect on fuel mileage, according to Edmunds.com's tests.

Using cruise control on the highway, though, really does have a noticeable effect on fuel economy. In Edmunds.com's test using a Land Rover LR3 and a Ford Mustang, the Land Rover got almost 14 percent better mileage using cruise control set at 70 miles per hour rather than cruising at driver-controlled speeds between 65 and 75 miles per hour. The Mustang got 4.5 percent better mileage.

Using cruise control cuts down on unnecessary speed changes which can eat up gas, and it prevents "speed creep", the tendency for a driver's average speed to gradually increase with time spent on the road. (In that way, it can save you from an expensive speeding ticket, as well.)

If you want a big gain in fuel mileage, though, you need to seriously lay off the pedals when driving around town. Accelerating more slowly away from green lights and stopping more gradually for red lights cut fuel consumption in Edmunds.com's tests by 35.4 percent for the Land Rover and 27.1 percent for the Mustang.

Slamming down the gas pedal pushes more fuel into the engine while it also keeps the engine running faster.

You can also save a lot of gas by just lifting your foot off the accelerator as soon as possible when approaching a yellow or red light or a stop sign. For one thing, letting up on the gas sooner gives your car more coasting time.

By the way, when we say "accelerating hard" and "stopping abruptly", we aren't necessarily talking about juvenile tire-squealing antics. If you start keeping a conscious eye on how you drive, you may realize that you've been hot-rodding around for years without realizing it.

In Edmunds.com's tests, they slowed acceleration times down to a 20-second run from zero to sixty miles per hour. Compared to the kind of zero-to-sixty times we hear car makers bragging about these days, 20 seconds may sound impossibly slow. In fact, it is slow. But, while it won't get your pulse pounding, it will get you safely onto the highway.

Since most drivers don't have a stopwatch handy to time their acceleration, Cole Quinnel, a spokesman for Chrysler Corp. engineers, advises not pressing the gas pedal down by more than an inch unless you really have to. Using that approach, the difference in fuel economy will be appreciable.

Let's say that your car currently gets 22 miles per gallon overall. If this laid-back driving style gets you just 30 percent more in fuel mileage, which Edmunds.com's tests indicate it could, you'd see that increase to about 30 miles per gallon.

It's not easy, though. For most people, driving this way will feel, to say the least, awkward. When I tried Quinnel's high-mileage driving advice, it was difficult to maintain this disciplined approach to acceleration and deceleration without consistent effort. The minute I let my concentration slip -- Zoom! -- off I'd go again in a gas-wasting rush, just like I usually do.

And, to be perfectly honest, it was a little embarrassing to drive that way. Every molecule of testosterone in my body was begging to be excused for the day.

But, in a couple of short drives, the car was using significantly less gas per mile, even with my occasional slip-up. Maybe if I keep it up, I can soothe my dented ego with a little cash in my wallet.

Ford Engineer Says Tonneau Covers Provide 5-10% Fuel Savings

Tailgate Talk By Bruce Smith

Some questions never seem to be answered satisfactorily. For years humanity has grappled with burning issues such as "which came first, the chicken or the egg?" and "if a tree falls over in the forest and hits an import and no one is there to hear it, does it make any noise?"

Another Favorite for truck customers is whether or not the removal of the truck's tailgate in anyway impacts fuel economy.

Judging by the numbers of tail-less trucks driving down the highway, one would assume that their owners must have figured out driving with the tailgate down gives better fuel milage. And that kind of makes sense; the wind rushes over the cab and hits the tailgate, so it ahs to slow the truck down and reduce the fuel economy, right?

But as many customers already know, modifications may be visually appealing but may not always be cost effective. At least that's what the automotive designers find when they start placing pickup trucks in wind tunnels.

Bursting Their Bubble -- According to design experts, the truck tailgate is designed to create a cushion of air in the bed that aerodynamic engineers called a "seperated bubble" (the real nerdy ones refer to it as "Locked Vortex Flow.") Jargon aside, this invisible bubble of air actually helps deflect the faster moving wind coming over the cab so it passes over

the truck's raised tailgate, keeping drag behind the truck minimized.

"Putting the tailgate in the down position tends to increase turbulence and drag of the open box," explained Jack Williams, of Ford Aero Systems Engineering. "We've seen drag increase as much as .5 to 1 percent. Flow-through, web-like fabric replacement tailgates tend to increase drag even more; we've seen increases as much as 4 to 5

percent." In a nutshell, all of that extra drag translates into worse fuel economy for the vehicle. Dr. Edward Fitzgerald, an aerodynamics expert and a jet engine designer with Boeing, added that the effect is actually magnified with speed increases, so that 1 percent increase in drag with the tailgate down as city speeds has much more adverse effects on fuel economy at 70-75 mph on the open road.

Contrary to another popular myth, pickup size doesn't matter. Toyota engineers report that although the haven't done any EPA testing, they speculate dropping the tailgate can actually decrease fuel economy depending on the cab and bed configuration of the pickup.

As If That Weren't Enough -- Another concern with having the tailgate down or removed completely is the damage done to the tailgates exposed hinges and inner workings.

Driving with the tailgate open has been likened by some to slamming it closed repeatedly for whatever amount of time your customers are driving down the road. The bumpier the road, the worse the abuse.

According to many of those same experts, the best way to improve a pickup's fuel economy is to leave the tailgate up and cover the bed with a quality after market tonneau cover.

"Tonneau covers on pickup boxes reduce aerodynamic drag" said Ford's Jack Williams. "We've seen reductions of about 8 to 10 percent on the F150, which means the average fuel economy improvements for the EPA city/highway cycle(test) is about 2 percent.

"The average steady-state (cruise control) fuel economy improvement at highway speeds is close to 5 percent."

Adding a tonneau could mean an improvement in fuel mileage that is the equivalent of a free gallon of gas for every 20 gallons used.

The bill specifies a monument of more than five thousand acres and almost completely contains the Chile Canyons 4WD trail system. It also requires that adjacent lands to be managed to protect the resources in the proposed Monument. The sad thing is that there are hardly any fossils to protect. A massive land closure disguised as a new National Monument? You be the judge!

Check it out, read the information, and act according to your own conscience.

On Breaking Down

No one likes to break down, especially while on a vacation. At the Summer Quarterly in Colorado last week, several of us had our fair share of problems, but we managed to help each other out and make it through the event without anyone's fun being spoiled.

Upon arriving in Silverton on Sunday evening, I learned that Paul & Mary were having trouble with the refrigerator in their new Lance camper. It was working okay on A/C power, but wasn't very reliable on propane. But Chuck came to their rescue with his portable generator. It was just enough to get them through Wednesday, when we all moved up to Ridgway State Park and onto electric hookups. The solution came in the way of he and Ethyl May doubling up with Jimmy and Debbie to lead the trails. To get the crippled Jeep home (it was no longer flattowable), they loaded it onto Jimmy's trailer, and Debbie drove their Jeep all the way home.

On Tuesday, Jan & I did the Old Hundred Mine and the Mayflower Mill Tours. As soon as we got back on the paved road in Silverton, we heard a "tinkling" sound underneath the Jeep. (No, the Jeep wasn't peeing in the street!) We turned around and found that one of the control arm bolts had sheared off! The problem was that there was still a 1-inch piece of the bolt stuck in the control arm/bracked assembly. My options were to load the Jeep on the trailer and watch the rest of the week from the sidelines (although I was also scheduled to lead some trails at the Quarterly), or attempt a repair. However, to my TOTAL surprise, shop owner Bill MacDougall proceeded to LEND us several tools, including a drill, a set of bits, and a set of "easy outs". We took everything back to the campgrounds. We had the broken bolt out within minutes, although I snapped one of Bill's drill bits. I gathered up all of the tools, headed back to the shop, gave Bill a 20 for a couple of bolts,

with enough left over to cover the broken bit and a "tip", and headed back to camp. Everyone pitched in again and we had the Jeep back together well before our 6 pm dinner reservations at the Handlebar restaurant in Silverton. What teamwork! But I am still most impressed with Bill's willingness to help us by lending us his tools! So next time you are in Silverton and in need of some fuel, please stop by Triangle Conoco at 848 Greene Street (970-387-9990). He also has a motel next to the station and does Jeep rentals and repairs as well.



Finally, on the trip home, it was Tom Phillips' turn for some bad luck. We were taking an alternate route home, from Ridgway to Durango via Telluride, in order to avoid some of the many passes on Hwy 550. During one of the few long hill climbs, Tom's 6.0L Powerstroke, which was towing a 5th wheel AND his Jeep, started losing power and bellowing out heavy black smoke. He disconnected the Jeep and Carrie drove that to the top of the pass. Tom struggled up the hill with the camper and quickly determined that he probably "blew" the turbo. He drove the rig a few more miles and decided it would be best to drop off the 5th wheel at a roadside campground. Thinking that the unloaded truck would make it back to Albuquerque, Tom later decided to leave it at a Ford dealer in Durango. 



Wolfie announced a Caballo Lake trip with a date TBA.

Director Environmental Affairs Report - Mark Werkmeister: Mark was not present. Lauri did have information for the group. Wolfie, Lauri Rector, and Jerry Marx attended the Espanola District meeting on the roads issue on Thursday, August 10th. It was a good meeting, but one that requires immediate action from all of us. The forest service wants trails to be 100% GPS'ed no later than September 30th, 2006. That is not enough time. We need to write the Forest Supervisor and demand more time to complete our inventories! After they know the trails, there needs to be engineering analysis, an appeals process, maps need to be ready for 2010! NM Off Highway Vehicle Association has GPS logged many miles. They will almost all be single track trails. Trails that are closed now will not be in the inventory, and not considered to be re-opened; unless we resubmit it. The club needs to get out in small groups to GPS trails. We need to make sure we don't GPS trails that have already been done. Maybe a list can be placed on the member website to keep track. Pat Brady has some information that can be placed on the website; he is a coordination point for all this data. He will make a list of GPS coordinates. At this point he does not have a list of trails that have been documented. All we have is what's on Glenn's website. Everybody just needs to go up and do some exploring! Send an e-mail when you go on a trail, let everybody know it has been GPS logged!

This club needs a coordinator for this issue of what trails to run. Barbara Hall is going to head a committee to organize trails that need to be run. Please step up to volunteer. Contact her if you can help. barbarahall22@earthlink.net

Questions asked by members:

Q: What format does the Forrest Service use for GPS?

A: By law, the FS has to accept what we give them. Any format is fine.

Q: Where should we start the tracks?

A: Wherever you start; off a major road. Anything and everything. There are many trails that we run that are not on maps!

Q: Is it every forest in the state that is requiring this?

A: It is Forest Service and BLM nation wide. We have not heard from BLM. Many states have been dragging their feet. Everybody is required to do this.

Q: What trails do we need to do this on? Is there a list of what we can GPS?

A: We need to coordinate our efforts, and soon. We need people to volunteer to lead trails. Maybe email the trails to people and then take volunteers.

Q: How much more time do we want if we ask for an extension??

A: 4 months is reasonable, by next Spring. Gates may be closed during winter, fire restrictions.

Lauri received a Cibola National Forest survey, (link to a website to fill out) She is not sure if they want to hear what she has to say or the whole group. Everybody should fill out that survey. http://www.surveymonkey.com/s.asp?A=13952794 OE28022. If you have ideas of what is important to say, let Lauri know. She will do a survey to represent the club. Send her an e-mail with feed back.

Cibola National Forest wants to conduct personal interviews with people. Lauri has one scheduled. She is looking for somebody who would like to be a part of that and help her. That is all that Lauri knows that Cibola has done. Each forest is setting there own schedule. Sustainable, safe and fun are the three goals they want to meet. Glen has a schedule of the meetings. It is also on the Santa Fe National forest website.

The Jemez Ranger District is having a meeting on August 15, Wednesday 6:00PM at the Wallatowa visitor center in Jemez. We need to pack the house. Lauri has a form that you can fill out if you can't make it. It can't hurt to fill one out.

Program Chairman's Report – Jerry Marx: We are getting low on club apparel. It is time to

replenish. Jerry would like to place a new order. We have to get in the \$500 to \$600 dollar range to get a good price. If you have a specific want/desire let Jerry know, he will try to fulfill. Let him know what size you want. A motion was made to allocate \$650.00 - \$750.00 for a new order. All were in favor.

Member Spotlight: Tony Louderbaugh & Greta Berry

"Seasoned knees" were the impetus for Tony Louderbough buying his Jeep and joining NM4W. For someone who grew up hiking and sometimes carrying a 45-lb. backpack, it was tough to acknowledge that his knees weren't taking kindly to long and strenuous hikes. Nowadays, he and Greta still hike—they just use the Jeep to get them to

jumping-off places. Says Tony, "The Jeep will take us to 5,000 ft., and then we'll hike the last 2,000 ft."

Tony actually had a four-wheeling stint in his late teens, when he had a BMW motorcycle and his brother had a Nissan Patrol. They sometimes traded vehicles and Tony remembers taking the Patrol into the Manzanos. Then came school, family, and career—and not enough time or money for four-wheeling.

Three years ago, Tony and his wife, Greta (pronounced like Rita with a G), rented a Jeep in Ouray. After paying \$150/day rental fees and having the Jeep scrutinized for the tiniest scratch, they decided to get their own Jeep. In January 2006, Tony bought his 1999 Wrangler TJ from a Tucson resident. For this long-distance purchase, Tony cajoled his daughter, a University of Arizona student, into checking out the TJ. She crawled under the Jeep, cell phone in hand, checking this and that for Dad (sounds like Dad owes daughter for that one!).

Tony learned about NM4W online and from member Jordan Souza who sold him a roof rack. After earning their points, Tony and Greta joined NM4W in July 2006.

Tony is at a crossroads with his Jeep. It's stock and has a 6-cylinder, manual transmission. He's added rocker guards and 31" MT/R tires. But now that he's had the TJ off road, he's thinking lockers, axles, and Dana 44s. He's pondering whether to upgrade the TJ or trade for a Rubicon (the proverbial boys-and-their-toys dilemma).

Now, back to the interesting stuff, Greta is a Farmington native and moved to Albuquerque to attend UNM. A Social Worker for many years, Greta now operates a home-based business, Human Initiatives Inc. She's a job profiler, meaning she identifies types of professions and current job skills needed by industry. For example, she learned that Landscape Technicians didn't have the skill to back up a truck and trailer. So TVI (we're now supposed to call it Central New Mexico Community College) incorporated backing up a truck and trailer into the curriculum for Landscape Technicians. Greta's findings helped business, students, and the school.

Tony was born in Watertown, Connecticut and moved to Albuquerque at age 9. His father had come through Albuquerque during the war and after one too many gray, cold winters moved the family to New Mexico sunshine. Tony earned his Social Work degree at NMSU and works for the State of New Mexico, Adult Protective Services Division. A Social Worker and Investigator, he investigates abuse and neglect in nursing homes and assisted-living facilities. Tony says, "It's a 'fun' job because you do something extremely useful. We bust bad people who do bad things to the elderly." Tony stresses that many facilities are good and there are just a few bad apples.

Greta and Tony have two daughters. Sarah is a Montessori teacher in Portland, Oregon and Jeanne is a PhD student in Molecular Biology at the U of A (she's the daughter who crawled under the TJ). The family has two dogs, Cleo and Chancellor. They're pound dogs and a bit large for the Jeep—so they haven't been on outings yet.

An interesting family story is how Greta's sister, Marty Morgan, became an Albuquerque resident. Greta's father passed away on August 24, 2005 (our condolences to Greta). The day before Hurricane Katrina hit, Marty, a New Orleans resident, left New Orleans to attend their father's memorial service in Farmington. The hurricane spared the family's home, but not their jobs. The family relocated to Albuquerque and her sister got a job at Intel. Greta and Tony's nephew, Marten, was given a scholarship at Sandia Prep. This generosity allowed him to complete his education at a high school on par with his New Orleans school. Greta. her sister, and their families are happy they ended up safe and sound in Albuquerque.

Greta is an accomplished "tool girl" according to Tony. She excels at landscaping and carpentry. Tony likes to cook, especially pasta (he's Italian) and fish. Their favorite pastime is traveling to scenic, outdoor areas. Cities don't hold much interest for them.

Their ultimate dream is a long-term camping trip from the Canadian Rockies to the Alaskan Yukon. But for now, they look forward to shorter trips—the

Valle Calderas driving tour on August 26, maybe something in the Silver City area, and more trips to Colorado. They had a great time running Imogene Pass and Buffalo Boy at the NM4W-hosted Southwest Four Wheel Drive Association's Summer Quarterly.

As a two-month member, Tony appreciates NM4W members' willingness to share driving tips (picking lines, using low range, etc). He's equally appreciative of the group's Tread Lightly philosophy. "It's important to be proactive in preserving what we respectfully do in the forest. We need a club to advocate our use." From the Office of the Director of Environmental Affairs

Greetings NM4W club members!

First of all, I would like to thank everyone who has taken the time to attend a meeting, GPS a trail, or gotten involved in any way in helping to define the future of motorized recreation on the Santa Fe National Forest! Those that have taken the time to be involved are owed a great deal by the others whose schedules have not allowed them to participate. Those that have been involved will be owed a great deal of gratitude by everyone who enjoys the Santa Fe National Forest trails for years to come!

Here is a quick report of where the process is, where it is going, and what YOUR next steps should be.

First of all, an update on the process:

The Forest Service is about two thirds through their initial "kick-off" public meeting schedule. If you haven't been able to attend one yet (and I highly recommend that you try to attend one) the best opportunity is the meeting in Santa Fe on Wednesday night, 30 Aug. It is at the Unitarian Church Auditorium located at 107 W Barcelona

Road in Santa Fe. The meeting is from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm. It is best to be there by 6:00 pm as this is run as an actual meeting with an agenda, and not an "open house" format. It will be possible to leave earlier because most of the information is in the first two hours of the meeting.

And now, on to the "where it is going":

There is currently a deadline of September 30th for the FS to receive all user input to the trail inventory. By "user input", I mean GPS tracks of any routes that we want considered, that are not currently on the FS maps. More on this later in the report. Based on user input at the previous meetings, the FS is considering a revised schedule, but will not make the decision until after all of the kick-off meetings have concluded. So if you want to help influence their decision, attend the Santa Fe meeting on the 30th and make it clear that we welcome an extension! The Forest Service has clearly indicated that they will take all forms of route information. This includes GPS tracks from common GPS units like Garmin, Magellen, etc., lines drawn on maps, copies of old maps, even sketches on the back of BUT, naturally, the better the napkins. information, the easier it is for them to add it to the inventory so GPS information is the most useful.

One of the issues that the FS heard the loudest at the Jemez meeting (and I am assuming at other meetings) is the availability of the current inventory on maps that are available to the public. After the Jemez meeting, the FS agreed to publish the maps in a format (Adobe/.pdf) that is much easier to access. They were able to accomplish this by the following Friday! The maps are currently posted on their Travel Management website toward the bottom of the page. The maps that we primarily need to look at are the first and third ones on the list. These maps consist of the background, the routes, AND the FS road numbers for the east and west side of the SFNF.

Due to the background, these are HUGE files with the west half being almost 30MB. You will need a pretty fast connection to be able to successfully download the map before you fall asleep or get so hungry that you order a pizza. I am seeking a place to get hard copies of these maps produced at a reasonable cost. Even if it costs us a bunch (I was quoted up to \$10.00 a square foot which would make the maps \$120 a piece!), we can produce one for "group" use. I hope to have maps produced this weekend. If I can get some made, I will post the information and/or set up a time and place for us to review them as a club.

And that brings us to next steps. It is still very important to get all of our routes GPS'ed by September 30th if they are not on the current Forest Service maps. BUT, and this is a big "BUT", please take the opportunity to check the FS maps to see if the routes are already there. If they are, GPS'ing is a complete waste of our time and effort. If the routes are already on the inventory maps, we don't need to GPS them!!!! I have checked the maps pretty extensively, and they seem to be very complete. So....please check the maps, determine what needs to be GPS'ed and then work on the stuff that is missing!!!! I think it will be primarily little connectors or slight reroutes that need to be mapped if anything at all.

After the inventory process is complete, we will be moving into the next step, which is to identify the routes and route networks that we want identified as part of the motorized recreation system. because the routes are in the inventory and on the maps, doesn't mean that they won't still be eliminated during the rest of this process. We need to create logical loops and networks incorporating our favorite routes. We need to identify any additional links that need to be added to create the loops and networks. Ultimately, we will need to produce a "Citizen's Proposal" that formally nominates these routes as appropriate for motorized use. I guarantee that the FS will be receiving a citizen's proposal from the closurists and WE WON'T LIKE IT. We need to make sure that we have produced our own proposal that provides an opposing viewpoint! I will have much more information and methods on this (we have examples to use as a template) as the process moves along.

First things first though...

- Attend a "kick-off" meeting if your schedule allows and you haven't attended one yet. See the remaining schedule here: http://www.fs.fed.us/r3/sfe/travelmgt/tmrad.pdf
- 2. Review the inventory maps that the FS has posted to the web site. See them at: http://www.fs.fed.us/r3/sfe/travelmgt/index.html
- 3. Compare the inventory maps to our own knowledge of our routes. Don't forget to look at things other than the western ridge of the Jemez. How about the stuff on the Caja del Rio? Tank Trap? And etc.
- 4. GPS anything that is missing.
- 5. Stay involved, vocal, and positive!

Secretary's Report – Beth Whiston: Everybody accepted the minutes as printed in the newsletter.

She does not really know how many drivers are needed yet. She had talked about wheeling in the Jemez; people have expressed concerns about the time of day that this would start. So it is not much of an option. Maybe do the Rio Puerco again?

New Runs: Sunday, September 17, Tom Hurt is going out to Glorieta Mesa. He does not know what it will be like. He's taking the Suburban. Nobody had any information to offer about the roads.

Director Environmental Affairs Report - Mark Werkmeister: Not present.

Mark had the mapping party at his house. It was very productive. The group made a list of about 20 trails. 12 - 15 trails were on the map. People were assigned trails to go GPS.

Brian Hawthorne, with BlueRibbon Coalition, introduced himself and spoke to the group. Brian is the Public Lands Director for BlueRibbon Coalition. Member Spotlight: Erwin & Jeannie Greven

Considering how much country they've already seen (Erwin has been to 50 states, Jeannie to 47), the Grevens still appreciate the many new, fascinating places they've discovered with NM4W. Says Erwin, "The club is a good bunch of people who have a lot of fun and come up with neat trips." Some of their favorite "new" places to date: Canyon de Chelley, Caballo Lake, and Silverton.

Erwin learned about NM4W through a Google search three years ago. He and Cliff Meier had Trackers and wanted to four-wheel in areas close to Albuquerque. However, four-wheeling isn't new to either Erwin or Jeannie. Erwin's first 4WD vehicle was a 4-cylinder 1961 International Scout. Later, he drove a 1968 Jeepster, but sold it when it started costing too much (hey, Erwin, will you explain this

concept to my husband?). After the 2005 Chile Challenge, they decided the Trackers weren't up to Las Cruces-type rockcrawling. So Erwin and Cliff both got Jeeps.

Jeannie has enjoyed four-wheeling since her first Jeep run with relatives in Elsinore, CA. She was 10 years old and thought four-wheeling was the coolest thing imaginable. As a young adult, Jeannie learned about operating a 4WD vehicle during a summer job with the BLM in northern New Mexico. As low person on the totem pole, she got the last vehicle in the parking lot—an International Travel All. She headed out alone on her first day—and got stuck. She figured out how to winch, put in a deadman, and get the beast back to the yard (it was either that or tell the boss what happened). Jeannie still likes the challenge of using a 4WD vehicle to reach the backcountry.

The Grevens met in Minneapolis, but were literally born continents apart; Jeannie in San Bernardino, CA, and Erwin in Holland. Erwin's father was in the Dutch Merchant Marine, a career that took the family to New Zealand and other places. After his seafaring days, Erwin's father settled the family in Minneapolis where his brothers lived. Erwin attended high school in Minneapolis and then studied automotive repair and sheet metal at a tech school. He lived in Catalina, AZ (north of Tucson) and Plains, MT, then returned to Minneapolis. Erwin and Jeannie met at a dance in 1989 and married the next year.

Jeannie's route to Minneapolis was via Humboldt State College in Arcata, CA. Always an animal lover and outdoor enthusiast, she earned her B.S. in Wildlife Management at Humboldt. She worked several years for the Army Corps of Engineers in St. Paul, MN, and then transferred to U.S. Fish and Wildlife. Jeannie has written EIS (Environmental Impact Statements) for flood control projects, operated the federal aid program (funded by the taxes collected from gun sales and fishing equipment), and planned new wildlife refuges.

Currently, Jeannie is the Assistant Refuge Supervisor for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Regional office covering New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma, and Texas. That office oversees 44 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Refuges, including six in New Mexico. Her specific tasks are to coordinate permits, policy, and compatibility of refuges with various governmental requirements. Even though she's more deskbound these days, Jeannie has visited most of the New Mexico refuges (Bosque del Apache, Sevellita, Bitter Lake, Las Vegas, Maxwell, and San Andres) and many Texas refuges.

Erwin has always been a hands-on guy. He worked in sheet metal, auto repair, and drove a Chevron tanker truck. He used to own CARS, a Cedar Crest automotive repair shop. Then he worked for many years with Snap-On Tools and more recently with Cornwell Tools. Due to the slower economy, Cornwell Tools combined routes and eliminated Erwin's route. While between jobs, he's catching up on projects at their house and two-acre property in Sandia Park.

Their two horses, Honcho and Buck, also keep Erwin busy. Both Jeannie and Erwin, along with Cliff Meier, belong to the Back Country Horsemans group. They maintain trails in the wilderness areas in the Pecos and Manzanos, and regularly do work projects. Erwin and Cliff also serve as Torrance County Reserve Deputies (they do everything in law enforcement except write tickets). They often work the Balloon Fiesta atop their horses.



For relaxation, Jeannie likes to garden and watch movies. She's very knowledgeable about birds, flowers, and nature in general. At the Labor Day 2006 trip to the Zuni Mountains, Jeannie identified the big white bird we saw at Bluewater Lake as a

white pelican and seemed to know something about every rock on the ground. Jeannie and Erwin enjoy the time spent <u>out</u> of the Jeep as much as the windshield time. On the Zuni Mountain trip, they loved tromping around Diener, a ghost town, and Sawyer, an old logging camp with part of a trestle still visible. The Grevens are fascinated (and knowledgeable) about the history, flora, and fauna of the West.

Their '98 TJ has been getting them to the backcountry for the past year. Erwin found the TJ at Quality Jeep and says it was "junked up", but had a Dana 44 and was clean underneath. He's put in a $3\frac{1}{2}$ " lift, sway bar disconnects, front and rear bumpers, winch, and tire carrier combo. He's thinking about lockers and roll bar reinforcement.

Erwin and Jeannie have done the Moab Easter Jeep Safari the past five years and always find the trails awesome. To them, the crowds are exciting and it's fun when the Moab residents/visitors line the streets and wave as the Jeeps head for the trails. This year, the Fins & Things trail rated as Erwin and Jeannie's favorite. Two California trails they want to tackle are the Rubicon and the Mojave Road (an old stagecoach line, also of historic military significance).

Passionate about travel, the Grevens have toured Hong Kong, Ireland, Europe, and New Zealand. They also make time to visit family: Erwin's two grown sons and baby granddaughter in Minneapolis, his father in Arizona, and Jeannie's mother and sister in northern California.

Erwin and Jeannie have traveled to new places thanks to NM4W. And thanks to them, we've learned to appreciate some neat stuff <u>outside</u> the Jeeps.

From the Office of the Director of Environmental Affairs

There have been several items of note this past month. Most of them have been communicated via email, but here is a quick rehash for those of you who haven't been around: Santa Fe National Forest Travel Management Plan:

First of all, a big THANK YOU to all the club members who showed up for the "map marking party" at my house! Great work by all involved! We got a lot done and laid the foundation for more work in the coming months.

The kick-off meetings have wrapped up and the TMP team received overwhelming feedback that more time for user input was needed. Team Lead, Rob Potts, notified me that the deadline for user input will be extended to January 15th. There should be a formal press release out shortly. There are two points to be made about this extension. First, we have been given a great opportunity because we asked for it, now let's not waste it. Let's ensure that ALL of the trail/routes/roads that we want to be considered are identified on the maps. This includes any NEW opportunities that provide additional range of difficulty, create better loops, access interesting areas, etc. Let's get the information to the FS as soon as possible and not wait until January to turn our routes in to them. Secondly, this extension will not come without a "cost" in the form of some other piece of the process either being shortened or run concurrently with the user input. The Forest Service's final date hasn't moved so if we have more time to provide input, something else had to change to accommodate it. Again, let's make sure we don't waste it. Don't wait for the last minute to get out and explore/map and don't wait for the snow to fly! Oh! One more thing. Make sure you give the Forest Service, especially the Travel Management Team, a big THANK YOU via a letter or the next time you see them. Let them know how much we appreciate the extension and the opportunity to work with them.

The next step in the process, while we are gathering our data, will be a series of workshop meetings to start discussing what type of opportunities we need on the Forest. I will see to it that the club gets plenty of notice and background information/material to ensure we

are successful in representing and articulating our needs.

Trackways Monument:

The proposed national monument north of Las Cruces has taken many twists and turns. Fred Huff has been invited to go to Washington DC this week to testify before the Senate committee that is considering this legislation. We believe that it is losing steam and will ultimately be killed. You can help kill it by contacting Senator Domenici's and Senator Bingaman's offices and letting them know that you do not support making the area a national monument.

I was also able to attend a meeting in Las Cruces to discuss the possibility of a comprehensive land use bill for the public lands of Dona Ana County. The meeting was sponsored by the City of Las Cruces at the request of Senator Domenici's office. They are interested in wider public input before they draft the bill. The bill would include the Wilderness Study Areas there and could also include the area proposed for the trackways. It was a very positive meeting. and the motorized recreationsists in attendance (LCFWDC, SWFWDA, FMCA Four Wheelers, and NMOHVA) provided lots of compelling information to the City about appropriate designations for the areas. We will all continue to participate in this effort.

I put out a call to the membership and was awarded with eleven vehicles and several people to go with me on Saturday, August 26th. This included several guests, thanks mostly to Phil Rodacy. Those in attendance were Phil Rodacy and his friend Jim

Fulkerson in his TJ, Craig & Mary Turpin and girls in their Rubicon, Kathy Wolf & Mike Robertson in his Discovery, Bob Telepak in his XJ, Justin Simenson & Rebecca "Becca" Tafoya in his Rubicon, Paul Caskey and friend in his YJ, Jeff & Lauri Rector in her YJ, Jordan Sousa in his TJ, and me in my Jeepster. Other guests were Kristin Konnick and her Father Paul in her KJ, and Mark Smith & friend Jim Bohlken in Mark's 02 WJ.

We started at our usual place in Rio Rancho and headed out at 9:00 AM. We stopped at the parking spot after the Gilman tunnels and aired our tires down. I wanted to run the Holiday/Stable Mesa area and headed to the turn-off across the Rio Guadalupe. We crossed the river and headed up the mountain to the mesa. I had promised Mary Turpin I would show her the Giant Foot Print Indian Ruins for her soon-to-be visitors from Canada during the balloon fiesta. So that became our first destination. This trail will be submitted to the US Forest Service for their

ongoing Travel Management Plan as Bob's topo map indicated most of it was not on the map. All we did was follow existing forest service routes all day long. That should convince you of the importance of getting out and mapping trails.

Gilman Tunnels Closed


We went to the Jemez yesterday (23 Sep) to record some more GPS waypoints and discovered that FR 376 has been closed due to a rockslide in the vicinity of the tunnels. The road is closed right at the FS boundary on the south end, so FR 653 is not accessible to bypass the tunnels either. The closure sign stated that a .25 mile radius around the tunnels is off limits to foot traffic as well due to instability of the canyon walls. The area will remain closed for an indefinite time period. We ended up going around through Jemez Springs and accessing FR 376 from NM 126. Once we reached Porter, there was another sign stating that the road was closed 6 miles ahead. There was a trace of snow above 8,000 ft. Most of the aspen trees were still green. The next couple of weekends will probably be good for the fall colors.

Zuni Mountain Exploration Run Labor Day Weekend 2006

The Zuni Mountains is an area that has been a long time favorite of mine. Years ago, my dad and I, along with a whole list of others, would frequent the area to ride motorcycles. At least fifteen years passed by since we stopped going out to the Zuni's. I stared thinking of going back to re-discover the area where so many memories had been made. Then, I decided to get it on the calendar and invite the club to join us to explore the area. I had originally planned the trip earlier in the summer, but the forest was closed due to the high fire danger. We finally did it this past Labor Day weekend and we all had a great time.



We had a very nice-sized group. Those who attended include Mark and Joan Wolf, Cliff and Jeanne Meier, Paul and Mary Thompson, Erwin and Jeannie Greven, Jerry and Mary Moran (Saturday), Chuck and Ethel May Peeples, and Rance and Elizabeth Cochrane (Guests). We also had Beth's parents Pat and John with us, so we brought both the Ranger and the Jeep along to have seats for everyone.

Saturday we hit the trail at 9 AM. The roughest trail that we would encounter is the road around Bluewater Lake. As we set out, Chuck made radio contact with us as to meet us on the other side of the lake where he and Ethel May have a cabin. After a short stretch of blacktop and meeting up with the Peeples, we took FR 178 to the old town site of Diener. In the 1930's, an open-pit copper mine was developed in this area. Very little of the old mill site remains. From Diener, we traveled along FR 504 and took an offshoot to the top of Mt.

Sedgwick. At an elevation of 9,256 feet, we enjoyed 360-degree views, as well as an interesting quartz formation. From there, we took FR 504 down to FR 480 and headed east. It was getting close to lunch time, so I began to look for a side road to get away from the well maintained FR 480. I found one, but ran into numerous hunting camps, so we proceeded along until we reached the top of the mesa for a lunch spot. As we ate lunch, I was queried by several people "where does this road go?" or "have you been here before?" I answered I am not sure and no. I have not been here before. After all, this is an "exploration run" (i.e., a trail ride whereby the leader doesn't want to get fined as a result of making U-turns or otherwise getting lost!—ed.) After lunch, we continued along and came across a few deer in the woods. The road continued to the south until it terminated into an east-west road at a closed gate. I opened the gate and made a left to head east until we came along another road that led off to the right heading south. Then we broke out into a meadow among the remains of a few cabins. Continuing on, the road finally came out along FR 50 near Cold Springs. Then we took FR 50 to FR 49 and drove around the Cinder Pit and old lava flows. After that, we went along the ridge towards Quartz Hill, and dropped into Bonita Canyon where there were brilliant patches of yellow flowers. Once we got back to FR 49, it was getting late and we decided that it would be much quicker to take it into Grants and take the highway back to camp. After all, it was pot-luck night! I think that is the main reason that Wolfie decided to join us.



Sunday we took the same route to meet up with the Peeples. We turned off of FR 178 and headed west this time and followed the trail which parallels Bluewater Creek all the way to the old town site of Sawyer. Sawyer was the main logging camp from 1909 to 1921. About 200 people, including 60 children, lived at Sawyer. There was a general store, a schoolhouse, a boarding house, homes, and Navajo Hogan's in Sawyer. Many of the buildings were hauled away when the main logging camp was moved to Bluewater Lake. From Sawyer, we took FR 50 to FR 482 and found a lunch spot at an old windmill and train car. After lunch, FR 482 lead us to the southern edge of the Zuni Mountains. We crossed the Continental Divide at the "Big Notch" for a view across the valley looking at El Morro Then we took well-National Monument. maintained roads back to Bluewater State park. We all gathered for Peanuts, Chips, Salsa, Guacamole, and Quiche that afternoon. We also shared a campfire each night. What a great trip spent with good friends. We WILL do it again for sure!

Tires

Revised and updated for the 2006 Auge's 4x4 101 by Lauri Rector

Which tires do you really need? This is such a good question that I have actually witnessed, on several occasions, grown, intelligent men having a 45 minute conversation on tires. Then they will take a break to talk about how long they have been talking about tires and then start the conversation back up again for another 30 minutes.

You should ask yourself a couple of questions when deciding which tire is going to be best for you most of the time. Number 1; what do you want to do when you take your rig off the pavement? Number 2; what kind of ride and noise level will you tolerate when you drive your rig on the pavement? You could have more questions (such as wear and lasting power) but these should be strong considerations. The more correct you are with the answers, the happier you should be with tires that you purchase.

If you mainly drive your rig on the street and don't plan to do much more than take occasional trips down forest-service roads, then you should consider less aggressive, street-tread-style tires. Tires with less aggressive tread patterns wear longer and run quieter and smoother on pavement than an allterrain or mud-terrain tire. However, an all-terrain tire with a more aggressive tread will give you more traction on the trail while still maintaining a fairly good ride and noise level on pavement. A mudterrain tread will more often be a rougher ride and louder on pavement than an all-terrain tread - and will be progressively worse the more aggressive the tread pattern becomes. The more tread on the pavement, the better the tire wear and the longer they will last. Also, the tire compound will affect the tire wear and how long the tire will last.

The question for dedicated trail use of your rig is traction and whether you need the traction performance in mud, sand, snow, or on the rocks; or a combination thereof. Your priority for ride quality and road noise is pretty low. Also, tread life may not be as important to you as sidewall-puncture resistance. For a daily driver and wheeling in soft sand or soil, or slickrock, an all-terrain could be

your best choice. The wider tread will give you added floatation in the loose stuff and the added rubber you'll have on the ground will give you topnotch traction on sandstone and granite slabs. Finally, all-terrain tires are generally better for packed snow and ice than mud-terrain tires. This is because the large-tread blocks of a mud tire tend to hydroplane on the icy stuff because the higher ground pressure of their overall footprint causes the ice to melt under the tire; and the general lack of siping on mud-terrain tread sections means there's no place for the resultant water to go. However, in deep snow, all-terrain tires will pack up just as they do in mud. Mud tires, on the other hand, are great in deep mud and unpacked snow, as with a bit of wheel speed, the tread will clean itself out quickly. In addition, mud tires have proven themselves superior in jagged rocks, where their aggressive tread can find something to grab onto. A good softcompound mud-terrain tire also will work very well on sandstone and granite slabs, but hard-tread compounds can cause a mud tire to slip on rock almost like it was on ice.

There is also the specialty ice-and-snow tire. These tires use special construction and tread compounds that dissipate the water layer between the tire and the ice. This vastly improves the handling and stopping ability of these tires in frozen lands. These tires are very soft and flexible, with lots of siping, so that water is forced out of the tread quickly to aid in traction. Special ice-and-snow tires are recommended for seasonal use only, as they tend wear quickly.

There has been a trend among four-wheelers to have two sets of tires, one for street and one for trail. These are the folks who want the best tires for the conditions.

Caballo Lake Run

Therefore, I WOULD NOT recommend stock vehicles or vehicles without a limited slip or locker on this run this year. If you have questions or concerns, please let me know and I will answer them directly.

We will meet at our usual place, the Caballo Lake River Campground (that's the River Campground, **NOT** the Lake Campground). You can get there by taking exit 59 from I-25 about 12 miles south of Truth or Consequences. Make sure to fill up in T or C, as there are no fuel stations close to the campground. We will leave the campground on Saturday morning at 8:00 AM promptly – RAIN or SHINE!! That way we can get back to the campground to have a cookout. If there is enough interest, we can potluck it. Thanks! I await your response.

Mark will collect the petition at the end of the meeting and give it to the BlueRibbon coalition. Mark will send out contact information on Monday.

Santa Fe National Forest Travel Mgmt Plan: SFNF Travel Management plan has been extended to January 15th. Pat Brady is point of contact for collecting these tracks. Please get a copy of any tracks to Pat Brady. We need to also remember to ID some routes that have never been opened or had trails on them. There are many opportunities. Use

They need food and clothes (an APS employee with the homeless project will take students shopping for clothes). Provide money for cap and gown so seniors can participate in graduation. Provide financial help for the students who wish to participate in sports. Money for a uniform or the fee to play. Underwear and socks for all students. They run a preschool and after school tutoring program during the school year and summer for the 300-400 homeless children registered in APS. Non-perishable food/snacks that will be sent with the children at the end of the week to provide food during the weekend. Toiletry items for the students. School supplies. Just a huge variety of things as the need arises.

<u>Christmas Party</u>: Last year's hosts volunteered to do it again! Thank you Phil & Ilene Rodacy! That is so kind of you. The Christmas party will be Saturday, December 9th starting at 5 PM.

<u>Donation for Church</u>: Paul Thompson said that we are way overdue for giving a donation to the church. He suggested \$300.00, all were in favor.

Caballo Mountain/Palomas Gap Run

Friday evening, October 6th saw some only two vehicles arrive for the assault on the Caballo Mountain trail near Truth or Consequences. Joan and I arrived about 4:30 PM and found that the restrooms at the front of the park were closed (bad decision on the park's part!) and that's why so many unused spaces were located at that location in the park. Before we could get into a space, Glenn and Jan pulled in. We chatted about the limited space and decided we would park in one of those shared spaces, only away from each other by one space. That was all that was left! The place was full!

The weather wasn't too bad that night (a little rain overnight) and it was actually a beautiful morning. Jerry & Mary Moran had sent me an e-mail earlier in the week and asked how long it would take to get there. I told them two hours, but arriving after a two-and-one-half hour drive, I realized I had misled them. Joe Wilson also said he would be either going on Friday evening or Saturday morning. Not long after we got up and started getting things ready did Joe and his daughter Chelsea arrived up in his

TJ with a new long arm kit installed and ready to go! Joe had been here before and knew how much time he needed to get there on time. We finally pulled up to the entrance of the campground and waited for Jerry & Mary to come along. They got there a little before 9:00 and we immediately headed out for the other side of the dam to air down the tires.

We headed out in a westerly direction and then turned south to get to the road that leads around to the other side of the dam. It took us about 30 minutes to meander through fields of bright red chile peppers, onions, and cotton to reach the other side. Once there, we all stopped and aired down our tires for the day ahead. Glenn would take the rear and be our "Tail End Charlie" this trip.




We got to the trailhead without a mishap or getting lost. Once we turned on to the easterly roadway, you could tell the wash had run significantly during the rainy summer season, but the ranchers had graded it nicely and it was almost smooth! We headed off to the east to get to the trail head, which is about 3 miles from the dam. Once we reached it, we all turned left and headed to the northeast, following along the trail. The trail meanders through the desert until it finally dumps into a wash and continues to the northeast. This wash was deeper than in the past and the roadway was a little hard to identify. But, thanks to Glenn's new, fancy GPS unit, we knew the trail was farther east than I thought. Once you reach the spot where it turns out of the wash, there's an immediate washed out part of the trail that causes some air under the tires and heavy leaning to the right side. You can't roll over here as the bank is too tall on the bottom side preventing you from having a bad day. I could tell no one had been up this trail since the rains, as there were no tracks whatsoever.




We shortly reached the canyon bottom and started Glenn tried and conquered the the drive up. difficult option and he was very proud of himself. That is the first time he has tried a difficult option and went through it without a scratch or bent a something-or-other! We continued the trail along the canyon bottom. I noticed, and especially Jerry noticed, that the rocks were well exposed as the sand had been washed away from them. However, the first real hard spot was more difficult with the rocks preceding it than the actual hard spot. We finally had to tug Jerry a little here as the big rocks got to his Rubicon Unlimited's low-hanging skid plate. But, he was actually starting to have some fun and was glad he made it. There were several places in the wash that had large rocks exposed and a couple of them caused us to tug and jack Jerry's LJ up to retract it from the rock gods. It appeared at one time, just before you go up out of the wash, that he had crunched his fender flare, but it was plastic and automatically reshaped itself when it got loose from the rock.

We stopped at the first right turn again for lunch. It seems that I always make it this far for lunch. It was about 12:30 when we stopped. After a brief half hour, we got going again. The sun was pretty warm now, but not too hot. It was a long, bumpy ride to the top of the hill. That roadway was not

graded this time and there were quite a few washouts. But, everyone made it just fine. We did have to stop and wait for Glenn a couple of times as he was letting Jan drive (a big mistake, now she wants to drive all the time!).




When we got to the towers, there was only a slight breeze and lots of sunshine. We all looked around for a few minutes, helped Glenn tighten his track bar, and then got back in the Jeeps and headed towards Palomas Gap. We turned off the main road and headed into the cow pasture, making sure to close each gate that had been closed. Once we got to the cattle pond, we had to navigate around several cow pies. I called out over the radio how fun it was to run through an obstacle course of cow pies and was immediately awarded with a response from the young lady in Joe's Jeep (see Quote of the Month in this issue). It made me laugh, as I am a farm boy at heart!



The trail was washed out in a couple of spots and once I fell into a ravine on my side! I hate that! Joan had only a couple of things to say (no swearing), but we made it out okay and got going again before the rest could catch us. Well, almost I guess Joe was forced to wait a few anyway. seconds. Sorry for the delay! We went along fine after that and finally got into the wash again. It was getting to be about 3:30 PM and the clouds were in the west. We crept through the wash, trying to straddle, drive on, or miss the boulders that had been washed out into the open. Finally, Glenn called out that he was stuck. Before I could get to him, he was unstuck. Jerry once again had to manipulate the rocks with finesse as his 245 tires were the smallest of the group and they kept getting him stuck. It came up a lightning storm and then the rain started while we were in the wash. I hate lightning, but kept going to get out of the wash as quickly as possible. All of a sudden, Joe called out he was stuck! I thought, how could a guy with 35's and a long arm kit get stuck when my Jeepster with only 33's was going along fine? Seems he and his daughter were looking for frogs or turtles, and he failed to pay attention! He paid for it though, as he had to strap his long arm up so that it wouldn't droop, and then jack up the vehicle to pile rocks underneath the tire while it was raining! Jerry watched this and made sure he took the right line. About a half-hour later we were at the entrance to Palomas Gap. This "Gap" is an early stagecoach and trading route between the Rio Grande River and to the east. It was nearly 4:30 PM and time to get off this mountain. It was fun day and everyone had a good time.



It was funny when Mary said that my vehicle was so old, but yet had no trouble. Jerry told her it doesn't matter how old it is, just what kind of equipment it has. She was convinced after this trail (a type that Jerry had been wanting to go on since he joined this club) that Jerry definitely needs a lift kit and larger tires. I guess we can all guess what Jerry will be getting for Christmas! Joe on the other hand was glad that he had spent the money on the long arm kit as it worked great and he had a great time as well. From the Office of the Director of Environmental Affairs

Hello everyone! There is A LOT going on in the land use arena right now. This month, I am going to focus on two of them.

The first is the RS2477 legislation that was introduced by Steve Pearce in the waning days of the past congressional session. As I have said in previous messages, there is going to be a ton of greenie spin and backlash in the media, so it is important that we understand what is really being proposed and why. If you have the time and inclination, I highly recommend the RS2477 website sponsored by the Utah Association of Counties (www.rs2477roads.com). There is far more in-depth explanation and analysis there than most people probably want (or need), but there is also several shorter items that do a really good job of debunking some of the greenie myths that will be thrown around with abandon over the coming

months. Be aware that this particular site was created in the late 1990's when there was other, but similar, legislation being proposed. Some of the material is outdated, but none of the base concepts involving RS2477 have changed.

Here is how to get to the 'must-read' pieces of the website. Go to the link above and then click on the link that talks about the index. When you arrive at the index page, click on the link that says

"IF YOU ARE INTERESTED IN... A QUICK OVERVIEW OF THE 2477 ISSUE"

That will take you to three short links that give an excellent and concise background on RS2477. This issue will be re-introduced when Congress comes back in January, and we must be ready to support this effort.

The 2nd item is the Travel Management Process that is taking place on ALL FIVE National Forests in New Mexico (and every other forest in the entire So far, our club has been focused country.)! primarily on the Santa Fe National Forest with excellent attendance at the kick-off meetings. The next step in the travel management planning process is a series of Travel Analysis workshops. The first four meetings are in Santa Fe on 14 Nov, Espanola on 15 Nov, Los Alamos on 16 Nov, and Cuba on 18 Nov (all dates tentative). I will send out further details as soon as I have, and I encourage any and all of you to try to attend. This is a long-term effort, but it is important that our enthusiasm doesn't flag during the process.

The Cibola National Forest is also getting ready to kickoff their Travel Management Planning process. They are using a different approach in that they have contracted a professional 'collaboration' company to pilot the effort in the Sandia Ranger District. Bob Telepak is the official invitee representing 4WD and our club, but THESE ARE PUBLIC MEETINGS and everyone is invited to attend whether you have received invitations from the Forest Service or not. This first meeting is 26 Oct from 6:00 to 9:00 PM at the Hilton on University Blvd. There will be others!

Director of Environmental Affairs Report – Mark Werkmeister: The change in control of the House and Senate makes it much more unlikely that a Pearce RS2477 bill will be considered (or even get out of committee). Interestingly enough, a very anti-access bill to sunset RS2477 rights was introduced this past year. In the Republican-controlled house, it did not even make it out of committee. We may very well see more of this in the coming year and it will take a lot of effort to keep bad access legislation at bay. We will keep a close eye on it and continue to update the club.

The main focus right now should be the Travel Management Rule implementation in the various New Mexico National Forests. The Santa Fe National Forest is holding their first travel analysis workshops starting this next week (schedules are posted on the club web site). We will also be starting to prepare our own Citizen's Alternative, which the Forest Service will have to consider among the alternatives.

Member Spotlight: Paul Caskey

Paul has owned his '95 Jeep Wrangler for four years, but didn't know where to go four-wheeling in New Mexico. As he searched the web, he was drawn to the no-nonsense attitude and membership screening process of the New Mexico Four Wheelers. His first NM4W outing was the 2006 Memorial Day weekend trip to the Jemez.



It didn't cause any problems for us, but others use this trail as well (hikers, mountain bikers, etc) and it was pretty torn up. A "Citizen's Proposal" - What Does It Mean?

By now, most of you have probably heard me mention the term "Citizen's Proposal" when referring to the ongoing Travel Management Rule planning process. Did you ever wonder what I mean by "Citizen's Proposal" and how it might affect the future of our trails in the Santa Fe Forest and other forests?

The Santa Fe National Forest is in the midst of the travel management planning process brought about by the Travel Management Rule (the new Rule states, in effect, that all motorized travel on the Forests has to be on designated trails). We have attended a series of kick-off meetings and now are in the midst of the first round of "workshop" meetings. We are rapidly getting closer to the point where we will need to introduce a "Citizen's Proposal".

To understand the importance of the Proposal, it is necessary to have a basic understanding of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA). NEPA requires federal agencies to integrate environmental values into their decision making processes by considering the environmental impacts of their proposed actions and reasonable alternatives to those actions. To meet this requirement, federal agencies prepare a detailed statement known as an Environmental Impact A typical EIS requires a Statement (EIS). "preferred alternative", a "no action" alternative to provide a current baseline, and a range of other alternatives. The preferred alternative is the agency's best effort at taking all of the information they have (including public input) and using that information and their professional knowledge to craft a plan that best meets the requirements of whatever action they are undertaking.

As you might guess, the preferred alternative does not always meet the interests or requirements of interested bodies of the public. The agency has to solicit and consider input from the public, but they don't have to include that input in the preferred alternative if they don't believe it meets their various requirements. In order to provide the public a range of choices on which to comment, they are required to also provide a range of alternatives.

By general use and precedence, a well-thought-out and nicely documented "Citizen's Proposal" is usually given a place as one of the other alternatives considered. The anti-access groups have used

Citizen's Proposals to great effect in previous federal agency actions.

Why is getting our needs included as an alternative so important? Each of the alternatives included in the EIS requires full study and discussion of the alternative by the agency, how the alternative impacts the affected environment, and the environmental consequences of the proposed alternatives as it relates to the proposed action. In a nutshell, once a Citizen's Proposal is included as an alternative, the agency has to treat it seriously and give it the full weight of their available expertise. They can't just dismiss it! Having a motorized recreation sponsored alternative also gives the public a motorized recreation friendly alternative to support. If there is enough support, features of the alternative can get integrated into the final plan.

I am willing to serve as "compiler and editor" of a 4WD Citizen's Proposal, but I will need a LOT OF HELP. I am not familiar with ALL of the trails. I will need detailed descriptions of the trails, their locations, and their routes, what specific features they include that make them desirable and/or unique, how they relate to the larger trail network we are proposing, what potential environmental concerns their use may cause, and how those concerns could be mitigated. We have an excellent template to work from, but I won't lie to you: A Citizen's Proposal is a LOT OF WORK! The more complete and detailed it is, the easier it is for the agency to adopt it as a viable alternative to be considered.

The timing of our submission is important also. It needs to be soon enough that it can be integrated into the agency's range of alternatives considered (or even integrated into the preferred alternative). It needs to be late enough that we have some idea of how much of the existing roads system is gong to be left in place. It won't make sense to do a full analysis by the club of roads that we KNOW are going to be left open. My best guess is that we will need to submit it sometime between March and May 2007.

If you are interested in helping craft this proposal, please let me know. I will be actively

soliciting participants at the club's annual Christmas Party (you know, get them to volunteer when they are full of holiday cheer!). See you all there!


Tank Trap Trail by Glenn Bontly



Tank Trap has been one of my favorites since my first time through this challenging trail. I remember riding it at least 4 times the summer before last. With all the rains this past year, we've pretty much stayed away from this one. The whole trail is in the bottom of a stream bed; not a good place to be during the rainy season! On our 11 Nov trip, Jan & I had 15 vehicles join us: Mark Werkmeister dusted on his Scrambler, Pat & Sue Brady brought their soft-sprung Tacoma, Heath Hislop in his little Samurai (boasting 1300cc's of "high-revving fury"), Kristy in her TJ (whom Jan's 15 year old son, Brandon, chose to ride with cuz Kristy was "cuter" than Mark), the Whistons Jr. in their Unlimited, Dan Prichard (XJ) brought along former member Dixon Patrick, Don Miller (XJ) hosted guest Sheree Barns, Mark Berglund (TJ), Brad Opatz (TJ) with new Dana 44 front axle and 37" MT/Rs (I'm jealous), Justin Simenson and Rebecca Tafoya (TJ), Eric & Jasmine Capener (TJ), former member Steve Hunt from Santa Fe in his "too tall" 4-Runner, and guests Doug & Eric Pannel, Dennis Wong, and Mike McDuffy.



It's a long trek from Bernalillo to Santa Fe. And after the air down point, it's still another 30 minutes to the trail head. But it's well worth the trip to ride Tank Trap. If I could find another way into the trail, I would. Cuz the first obstacle is on an off-camber hill, whereby if you roll, you will end up upside down in a pond and probably drown. I'm sure it *feels* way worse than it really is. Anyway, the fact that it took over 2 hours to get 16 vehicles through should tell you something!



After that, there are a series of really big rocks throughout the trail to play on. Some obstacles have easy-moderate-hard options, others have bypasses. However, there are some sections that you *must* go through, and this is why the trail is rated as hard. For the most part, everyone's vehicle was reasonably well equipped for this trail. A few people had minor problems here and there, I'm sure some vehicles attained new "personality" that day;

but as far as I know, everyone made it through without any major damage. Darn, and I was hoping to get some practice using my new welder!



In all the times I've driven this trail, I've yet to find the right way out of the streambed. One day, we'll have to find a more appropriate route back to the road. But for that day, we just found a clearing and went cross-country style. Upon exiting the streambed, we heard people shooting in the local area. Most likely shot guns, as was evidenced by the shot that rained down on us just before we all jumped back in our vehicles and high-tailed it out of there with horns honking!

Air Compressors By Glenn Bontly

It's a well known fact that airing down your tires will significantly increase your traction on the trail, not to mention soften the ride. For the highway drive back to camp, however, you will need a way to refill your tires. Driving at high speed and low tire pressure is a very dangerous combination. And it gets old having to "bum" air from your trail buddies after every ride. A good onboard air system is a must-have accessory if you plan to air down for trail riding.

There are two primary types of air compressors: electric and engine-driven.

Electric compressors are compact, portable, and easy to install. However, even the expensive, high-

end units don't put out much volume, and they draw a lot of electrical power.

Compressors usually carry Cubic Feet per Minute (CFM) at various Pressures per Square Inch (PSI) ratings. For example, a VIAIR 500C compressor produces a volume of 1.4 CFM @ 100 PSI and draws 17 amps of power (www.viaircorp.com).

Engine-driven compressors are permanently mounted under your hood (i.e., non-portable) and they take up much more space than an electric, but they produce an incredible amount of volume and they won't run down your battery. A York 210 Series compressor, for example, is capable of producing 8+ CFM, depending on engine speed (http://www.kilbyenterprises.com/compressors.htm).

"Duty cycle" is another consideration. The York 210 has a 100% duty cycle, which means you can run it all day long. The VIAIR 500C, on the other hand, only has a 33% duty cycle at 100 PSI. This means you should only run it continuously for 20 minutes, followed by a 40-minute cool down period. In other words, you can probably air up all of your tires in one session, but you will have to turn down your buddy when he asks you for air. Otherwise, you risk burning up your compressor from overheating.

In addition to airing up tires, a good compressor (especially used in conjunction with a storage tank) can be used to run air tools and reseat tire beads.

You may have noticed my bias towards enginedriven compressors. I have one in my vehicle, and it has turned out to be the most useful accessory in my Jeep. For more info on my set up, visit my web site at www.webejeepin.com/Glenns_Jeep/onboard-airl.htm.
