President's Report

Be Prepared (It's a boy scout thing!)

It's five days before leaving to go to Green River, Utah and a week of exploring the San Rafael Swell. I decided to do a pre-trip check on our Chevy Colorado ZR2. Starting under the hood: air filter clean enough; washer fluid and antifreeze topped off; and oil level, battery terminals, serpentine belt, hoses, brake fluid, all good. The truck has electric power steering and a sealed transmission so nothing to check there.

Moving outside, turn signals head, tail, parking and brake lights all checked out good. I continued to check the tires and adjust air pressures. On to the spare – oops, it only had 10½ pounds pressure. I inspected the tire and found an old plug that I had put in. After pressurizing the tire, using soapy water I checked the plug and valve stem for leaks – none found. I further checked the tire and didn't see anything obvious to cause a leak. The plug must be leaking really slowly as I can't remember when I last checked the pressure in the spare – another oops.

I am grateful that the wheel stud got stuck and broke off while working in my shop and not out in the remote San Rafael swell needing to put on the spare. Whatever your vehicle pre-trip check is, do it

sooner rather than later and do it every time. That way you're prepared to handle anything you find and still go out and have fun.

NMOHVA Meeting Report

Frank Whiston and I attended the NMOHVA Annual Meeting. Here is a summary of this meeting:

Officers Report:

NMOHVA received a \$5K grant for Trail Maintenance tools and equipment. NMOHVA has classes to certify training in the use of this equipment for trail projects. CPR training, also. These classes are recognized by the USFS to certify volunteers in tasks such as chainsaw operation.

NMOHVA got a \$60K grant to do cattleguard crossing installations in the west zone of the Carson Nat Forest, replacing gates. This helps keep cattle in place in this area and eliminates having to open and close gates for vehicle traffic.

NMOHVA was instrumental in getting Chloride Canyon, in the Black Range area of the Gila Nat Forest, reopened after flood damage.

Sierra County OHV Alliance is working to open a 212-acre multi-use OHV park in the Elephant Bute NM area.

NMOHVA offered NEPA Training (National Environmental Policy Act) for the officers. "How to write a substantive Comment". Mark Werkmeister does the training. Knowing how to make these comments effectively is important in keeping OHV trails and roads open for the public's use.

NMOHVA is active in developing SxS routes in NM Other states have developed loops and routes for Side x Side OHV's.

NMOHVA membership is \$20/yr. for individuals and \$100/yr. for clubs.

NM4W, LC4WDC, and NMTA are among the current member clubs right now.

Recreational Resource Director's Report:

NMD G&F received a \$500K capital outlay grant for state projects:

NMOHVA officer elections were held netting several renewals and a new Treasurer.
